Missionary From Japan to Speak At Area Church Next Tuesday

Dr. Esther L. Hibbard, a Congregational Christian missionary who has taught at Doshisha University in Kyoto, Japan, since 1929 will speak before the Women's Association at North Congregational Church, Northwestern at Lasher on Tuesday, March 4, 1:30 p.m.

Her subject topic will be "Because Christ Came to Japan."

Dr. Hibbard, who is professor of English Literature and a leader in social and religious activities at the Women's College of Liberal Arts, Doshisha, is in the United States for a year's furlough. Since Japan is the inter-denominational study theme in Protestant churches this year, she will be speaking about that country extensively in schools and churches throughout the United States.

Born in Japan, where her father was a YMCA secretary, Esther Hibbard received her B. A. degree from Mount Holyoke College, South Hadley, Mass., in 1924. Later she studied for her M. A. degree at the University of Wisconsin and received her Ph. D. in Oriental Civilization from the University of Michigan. She taught for three years in Wisconsin before sailing for Japan in 1929.

From 1941 to 1946, after World War II had interrupted her service overseas, she taught the Japanese language at the University of Michigan and lectured in the Civil Affairs Training School of the U. S. Government at Northwestern University's Chicago campus.

Returning to Japan in 1946, Dr. Hibbard expected to encounter resentment against Americans, but instead found a warm welcome and sincere appreciation of Christian workers. When Doshisha University, which was founded in 1875, opened the new four-year Women's College in 1948, she was appointed the first dean.

This new college now has an enrollment of 1500 girls, about 150 of whom are Christians. Many of its graduates are holding responsible positions in Japan and the United States. One of them, Miss Motoko Ueno, is one of the advisers to the Japanese delegation to the United Nations Assembly.

In addition to her work in the College, Dr. Hibbard serves as a member of the Board of Deacons of the Doshisha Church in Kyoto.
