

Berkley Bears Show Champion Form, Extend Winning Streak

The Farmington Falcons' four-game winning streak was broken Friday as the league-leading Berkley Bears extended a string of victories that has been unbroken since the first game of the season. The Bears scored heavily from the beginning to the end of the game, making them the Inter-Lakes champs. They led the Falcons by five points at the end of the first half and increased it to 34-23 at half-time.

The Falcons outscored the Bears in the third period 15-3, but it was not enough to shorten their lead appreciably.

In the last quarter, the Bears saw to it that the Falcons did not repeat their performance earlier in the season. Five weeks ago Berkley held a comfortable lead at half-time.

The Falcon J.V. basketball team beat the Berkley J.V. by a score of 47-40 to win their twelfth game in a row, last Friday, February 21.

Berkley took an early lead in the game to end the first quarter score at 12-10.

The Falcons trailed the Bears also during the second quarter. But a score by Bill Wright of Farmington set the Falcons in the lead with a 21-19 score at the end of the first half.

During the third quarter the Falcons maintained their lead to end the third period score at 35-32 and end the game with a seven point difference.

Ray Jordan was high point scorer of the game with 17 points followed by Chuck Thompson with 16 points.

Martin scored 15 points for Berkley to become their principal scorer.

Tomorrow, the Falcon J.V. will try to win its thirteenth straight victory, from the Walled Lake J.V. L.E.W.
