

Early Trout Season  
Canceled For 1958

Michigan will not have an early rainbow trout fishing season in 1958 because sea lamprey depredations have seriously reduced rainbow spawning populations.

Conservation Department Director Gerald E. Eddy, who has authority to designate streams open to bow fishing during special spring and fall seasons, said the early spring season has been abandoned to give rainbows a better opportunity to spawn.

Falcons Lose to Walled Lake;  
End Season in League Cellar

Farmington was defeated in a tightly fought game last Friday night by Walled Lake, 57-50. It was the last game of the season.

Walled Lake, using a three man back court press, stalled Farmington for the first quarter, which ended 12-6 in the Vikings' favor.

Outscoring Walled Lake 14-8 in the second quarter, the Falcons fought back from a 16-8 deficit to gain a 20-20 tie at half-time. Both teams proved to be evenly matched in the third quarter as the lead changed hands constantly. As the buzzer sounded, a basket by Walled Lake put them ahead by one point, 28-27.

Tom Grimshaw, Farmington's leading scorer, poured in the final majority of his 15 points in the final

quarter, to give the Falcons a momentary lead. In spite of his efforts, the Vikings, led by Doug McClelland, proved to be too much for the Falcons cagers, as they went down to defeat for the eleventh time this year. The Falcons won five.

High point man of the game was Walled Lake's Dennis McClelland with 27 points. For Farmington, following Grimshaw was Al LeSage with 10 points.

The Falcons travel to Southfield March 8 for the district tournament. They will meet the winners of the Pontiac-Southfield game. The game is scheduled for 9 p.m.

Wrestling Statistics

Falcons Compile Impressive Record

The following statistics on the Farmington Falcon wrestling team were released this week by Athletic Director Jack Cotton.

During the past season the Falcons won eight meets and lost four. Individual match records in dual meet results show that the Falcons won 45 matches, lost 58 and tied two.

Pinned opponents in 55 matches, or 66 per cent of matches won, were by far—were pinned by opponent in 22 matches, or only 38 per cent matches lost were by fall.

Captain Jim Marsh (120 pounds) won 11, lost one. League champion, pinned nine opponents, scored 51 of a possible 60 team points. Lost only match by a 1-score. Had fast dual meet pin of the year: 0:32 seconds.

Don Margherini (Junior, 95 pounds). Won nine, lost two. New to wrestling this year, Don lost his first match of the year, but won two matches by scores of 8-0 and 3-0, then won nine in a row seven of them by falls. Scored 41 per cent of a possible 55 team points. Had the fastest pin of the year in our Christmas Tournament—set a varsity record of 0:28 seconds.

Tom Packham (Junior, 112 pounds). Won ten, lost two. Tom lost his first match of the year, then won ten of his next eleven, the only other loss being a narrow 1-2 decision.

Amos Deaven (Junior, 133 lb.) Won eight, lost two. League champion, another first year wrestler, lost one of his two matches by a 4-3 score while wrestling alone his weight class.

Jerry Cassell (Sophomore, 127 lbs.) Won six, lost one. Because ineligible at mid-semester, his only loss came while wrestling above his weight class. Scored 23 of a possible 35 points.

The boys listed above as well as Don Hendryx (Sophomore, 103 lbs.) Won six, lost four; John Clark (Senior, 163 lbs.) Won seven, lost four; and Don Ressler (Junior, 175 lbs.) Won seven, lost four.

Wrestled the entire dual meet season without being pinned. Ressler gained all seven of his victories by falls.

In 12 dual meets, Farmington wrestlers at the lower size weight classes (95, 103, 112, 120, 127, 133 lbs.) have lost only 14 per cent 72 matches, and only three of these by falls.

Best records by weight class are 133 lbs. Won eleven, lost one, and 112 and 127 lbs. Won ten, lost two.

Weakest record by weight class are 138 lbs. Won three, lost eight; 145, won three, lost seven and tied one.

Farmington wrestlers averaged 4.6 falls per match.

Farmington opponents averaged 1.8 falls per match.

A tabulation shows that F.H.S. received five sports awards in the year 1948: three in '50 and '51; four in '52; and one in '53, '54, and '55. F.H.S. has been awarded no trophies since 1958. The majority of the awards has been in basketball.
