ENROLLMENT projects through '60 were made and needs of the district determined. It was decided that the first objective should be to provide enough classrooms so that all children could be on full-day sessions and that schools be made functional in consistancy with the educational program being followed:

Funds authorized in the past two years through a \$2,000,000 bond issue in 1985 and a \$4,000,000 bond issue last year, plus a Federal grant of \$278,833, are making this possible. When all construction from the \$4,000,000 bond issue is completed, it will not only be possible-to have additional facilities to satisfy projected enrollment needs at the junior and senior high levels through 1960.

Figures compiled by Superintendent G. V. Harrison show exactly how this money has been or is being spent and what it is providing.

IF A GOOD functioning school system is to; be maintained with all youngsters on full day sessions, however, the building program can not be stopped now because present needs are satisfied, school officials emphasized. Conservative enrollment projects show that two more elementary schools will be needed by 1859 if all grades are to continue on full-day sessions. The money must be asked for now to assure completion of these buildings by September of 150.

When projections were made in 1955 it was estimated that a \$2,000,000 bond issue would be necessary this year with a need for three elementary schools. Because of the decline in anticipated building last year, however, it has since been decided that two elementary schools will provide sufficient classrooms and the amount of the 1958 bond issue thus reduced to \$1,500,000.
