

No Increase in Tax Rate

(Continued from Page 1A) ENROLLMENT projects through '60 were made and needs of the district determined. It was decided that the first objective should be to provide enough classrooms so that all children could be on full-day sessions and that schools be made functional in consistency with the educational program being followed.

During the past two years through a \$2,000,000 bond issue in 1956 and a \$4,000,000 bond issue last year, plus a Federal grant of \$278,833, are making this year completed. When all construction from the \$4,000,000 bond issue is completed, it will not only be possible to have all grade school youngsters on full-day sessions but also to have additional facilities to satisfy the enrollment needs at the junior and senior high levels through 1960.

Figures compiled by Superintendent G. V. Harrison show exactly how this money has been or is being spent and what it is providing.

TOTAL EXPENDITURES \$6,278,833.00 IF A GOOD functioning school system is to be maintained with all youngsters on full day sessions, however, the building program can not be stopped now because present needs are satisfied, school officials emphasized.

When projections were made in 1955 it was estimated that a \$2,000,000 bond issue would be necessary this year with a need for three elementary schools. Because of the decline in anticipated building last year, however, it has since been decided that two elementary schools will provide sufficient classrooms for the amount of the 1958 bond issue which is expected to be \$3,500,000.

THIS YEAR, for the first time, voters will cast their ballots in two precincts. The division line follows the center line of Ten Mile Road from Inkster Road to Orchard Lake, the City of Farmington north boundary line from Orchard Lake to Gill Road and the center line of Grand River Avenue from U.S. 161 from Inkster Road to Haggerty Road. All persons living south of this line will vote in Precinct 1 with the polling place at the Farmington Junior High gymnasium. Those living north of this line will vote in Precinct 2. Voters in this precinct will cast their ballots in the lobby at the O. E. Duncel Junior High.

Polls will be open in both precincts from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Voters are urged to cast their ballots during all possible hours to avoid the necessity of a long wait during the closing hours.
