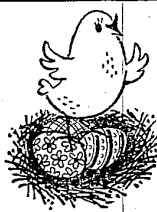

Mr. Arthur Goss, a former resident, entered McPherson Hospital at Howell on Wednesday for an operation.

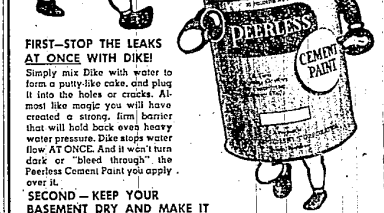
