TOWNSHIP BOARD PROCEEDINGS

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington Township Board was called for March 11 A. D., 1958, at 8:09 P.M. by Mr. Stephenson, Chairman.

Minutes of last Regular Meeting held on February 25, 1958, read by Clerk.

MOTION by Hug, supported by Westlake, that the Minutes stand approved as read. Carried, unanimously.

Minutes of Special Meeting held on March 3rd, 1958, read by Clerk.

MOTION by Fisher, supported by Westlake, that the Minutes stand approved as read. Carried, unanimously.

Mr. Brown asked that Minutes show he was out of town and had not received sufficient notice of the meeting.

MOTION by Westlake, supported by Hug, that we approve the granting of application of Norman Fournier for a 1/2 Mile Road, for SDM license, and that license be granted. Roll Call Vote: 5 Yeas, 0 Nays.

MOTION by Fisher, supported by Hug, that request for rezoning from H. Schenberger on Farmington Road be referred to Planning Board for recommendation. Carried, unanimously.

MOTION by Westlake, supported by Fisher, that request of Thomas J. Cornell, for rezoning of property near 42nd Street, be referred to Planning Board for study and recommendation. Carried, unanimously.

MOTION by Avery, supported by Hug, that the Board authorize Clerk to ask Oakland County Road Commission for trial survey at corner of Orchard Lake and Thirteenth Mile Road, and urge the placing of "Stop" sign at such intersection. Carried, unanimously.

MOTION by Fisher, supported by Westlake, that Michigan Bell Telephone Company be granted approval for underground line on Powers between Eight Mile and Coffey. Carried, unanimously.

MOTION by Brown, supported by Hug, that matter of paving Wheeler Street from Fire Station to Grand River be referred to Road Committee for study and report. Carried, unanimously.

MOTION by Brown, supported by Fisher, that the Board authorize Mr. Robbins, Township Attorney, to continue in the defense of the suit of Brown vs. Township and go on record in favoring the retention of attorneys in behalf of Mr. Schullkins in this matter. Roll Call Vote: 6 Yeas, Carried.

used in the Detroit Code the words Department of Public Buildings and Building Safety of Farmington Township shall be substituted therefor.

Section 6. Whenever and wherever the word "Bureau" is used in the Detroit Code the words Department of Buildings and Building Safety of Farmington Township shall be substituted therefor.

Section 7. Printed copies of the Official Plumbing Code of the City of Detroit containing all amendments up to August 30, 1956, shall be kept in the office of the Township Clerk, available for inspection by and distribution and sale to the public at all times.

Section 8. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 9. If any part or parts of this ordinance are in violation of this Ordinance is continued or permitted to exist without compliance, shall constitute a continuing offense punishable upon conviction in the manner prescribed in this section.

Section 10. Any person, firm, or corporation, or their legal successors, or any one acting in their behalf, violating any of the provisions, regulations or codes lawfully promulgated or adopted hereunder shall upon conviction thereof be subject to a fine of not more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or to imprisonment in the County Jail for a term of not more than Ninety (90) days or to both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

Section 11. This Ordinance shall be effective when adopted by the Township and when so after thirty (30) days have elapsed after the first publication of said Ordinance. Effective April 10, 1958.

MOTION by Fisher, supported by Avery, that Mr. Robbins, Township Attorney, be authorized to proceed in the defense of the case. Carried, unanimously.

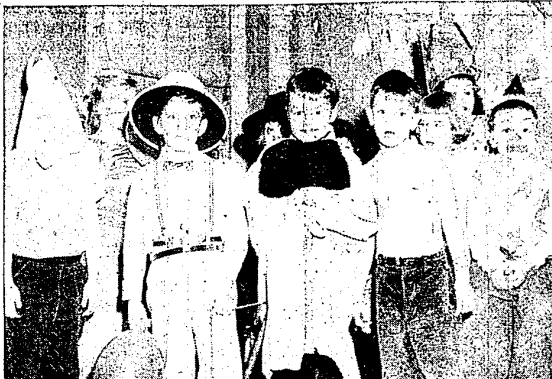
MOTION by Brown, supported by Fisher, that the Plumbing Code Ordinance be amended to provide for the adoption of the Official Plumbing Code of the City of Detroit which is Ordinance number 849-E with amendments to August 30, 1956, regulating all matters concerning or pertaining to the installation, alteration, maintenance, inspection, and reinspection of the plumbing, drainage, and water supply systems in all buildings and premises in the Township of Farmington, except public sewers and township water supply mains, and service connections, and service pipes up to and including the valve on the discharge side of the meter, defining the powers and duties of the Department of Buildings and Safety Engineering in relation to the inspection of installations, alterations or maintenance of plumbing and drainage; authorizing the Department of Buildings and Safety Engineering to collect fees for permits, surveys, licenses, tests, certificates and/or inspections; to provide for the licensing and registration of plumbers and other tradesmen who install, alter, maintain or service plumbing, drainage, or water supply systems in any building, structure or premises in the Township of Farmington; providing a penalty for the violation thereof and repealing all sections of former ordinances which may be in conflict therewith. Carried, unanimously.

MOTION by Fisher, supported by Avery, that a meeting of the Board be held on Thursday, March 18th, at 7:30 P.M., to review the tentative Budget, and decide meeting place for Annual Meeting. Carried, unanimously.

MOTION by Cairns, supported by Fisher, to rescind Motion made by Avery and supported by Fisher, with their approval, to rent Senior High School for Township Annual Meeting on April 5th. Carried, unanimously.

MOTION by Brown, supported by Hug, that Amendment to Health Ordinance covering responsibility for "employer" as well as the employee to obtain Food Handler's cards, effective July 1st, be referred to Legal Department for study and recommendations. Carried, unanimously.

MOTION by Avery, supported by Fisher, that the Board of Health be authorized to post a condemnation sign on house on Rockcastle, Dr. Broadman.
