 He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth L. Swarthout of 2101 St. Francis Street.

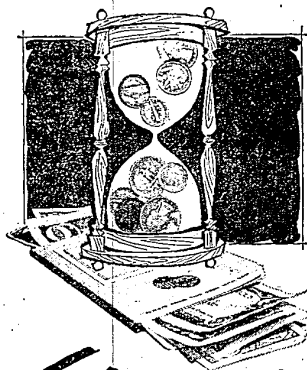

### First Stamp of 1958 Honors Gardeners, Put on Sale Monday

The first stamp to be issued this year by the United States is a Garden and Horticulture commemorative which went on sale locally and in other postal districts across the nation on Monday. The stamp has been issued on the 100th anniversary of Liberty Hyde Bailey, horticulturist and botanist, in conjunction with the centennial celebration in his honor sponsored by Cornell University. Dr. Bailey taught at Cornell from 1888 to 1931. A native of Michigan, Dr. Bailey graduated from Michigan State University and was a pioneer teacher in the horticultural school there. He devoted his life to this field and his writings and scientific work along this line have done much to enrich life as a result.

The Farmington Garden Club bought the first sheet of these stamps sold by the Farmington Post Office, as well as 2,000 stamps for its Board members. To simplify the handling of stamps at the March meeting of the Farmington Garden Club, the president, Mrs. Walter Gaertner, suggested that the members buy their stamps directly from the post office and recommended that they buy them as early as possible as the supply is limited. The Farmington Garden Club also sent a hundred specially printed first-day cover envelopes to Ithaca, New York, for the first-day postmark cancellation, half of these for the members of the club and half for the Junior Gardeners. In years to come these may very well become collectors' items and

In any event, will be a pleasant reminder of club associations, Mrs. Gaertner said. The Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan hope to dedicate a garden this year honoring Dr. Bailey at South Haven, Michigan, his birthplace. The Farmington Garden Club has also contributed to the fund for the establishment of this garden. Designed by Denver Gillem in vertical format, the stamp is of 3-cent denomination, printed in green. The central design features a figure emblematic of the bountiful earth, holding a horn of plenty and surrounded by flowers, fruits, vegetables and shrubs. A rose and a columbine, two of the most popular flowers in America and official flowers of two of the nation's largest organizations of garden clubs, appear in the upper right hand corner.

The book describes, with commanding authority, how Communist infiltrators work their way into magazines, movies, television and other communications media by actually fooling and using non-Communists to front for them. The Communist propaganda thus planned takes several tactical directions; it creates disrespect for vital institutions in the structure of the American way of life, it creates sympathy for objectives being secretly pushed by the Communist apparatus, it turns group against group, it sets about undermining the moral fiber of our people, especially the youth of America.

### Our Destruction Sought

The main stream of propaganda encountered in the "Pentagon" by the book's principal character, Brett Cable, is designed to weaken and ultimately destroy service morale. The propaganda is contained in magazines articles, particularly those published in magazines catering to the services and to high-school-age boys. In the story, the conspirators have worked so cunningly that they obtain signed endorsements of the magazines from high ranking Pentagon officials. Such magazines can be found on newsstands all over America today.

Only a comparatively few people are aware of the extent and power of the Communist propaganda apparatus which is estimated to be spending \$40 million a year in America. As a noted psychiatrist explained: "People condition their minds to blot out unpleasant things. The Communist ignorance within this country is unpleasant to contemplate. Most people direct their thoughts to something more pleasant. Therefore, they build up a subconscious disbelief in the reality of such a thing."

But it is real, and thus more of our people must be shocked into awareness of its danger, so that our great system which has enabled us to have prosperity and freedom will survive the attacks against it.

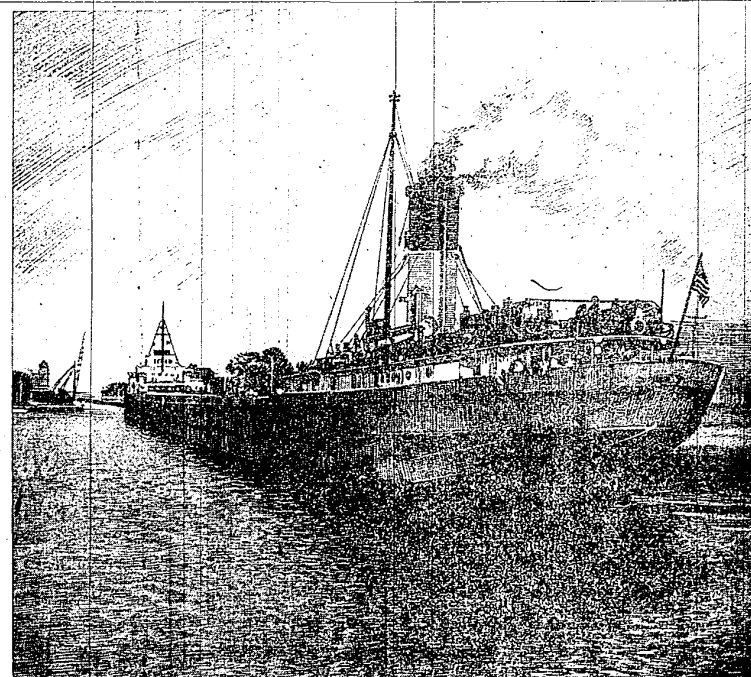
