The President's \$73.9 billion budget for fiscal 1959 breaks down as follows: \$47.1 billion for national security projects; \$6.4 billion for benefits of various kinds; \$7.9 billion for interest on the national debt; \$2.8 billion for general government revenues, estimated at \$74.4 billion, would come from these sources: \$38.5 billion from individuals; \$20.4 billion from corporations; \$9.3 billion from excise taxes; \$6.2 billion from other levies.
