Jobless Office Opened in Area

A new branch office of the Michigan Employment Security Commission (MESC) was opened Monday at 28125 Grand River Avenue near Eight Mile because of the increasing number of unemployment benefit claims being made by residents of this area.

The new office will serve Farmington City and Township, Livonia, Novi, Walled Lake, Southfield Township, Franklin and New Hudson as well as residents living in Detroit postal zones 19, 20, 40 and 41.

The new office will take a considerable amount of the overload of work at the MESC branch office at Schaefer and Schoolcraft, officials said.

Two other temporary offices, for payment of unemployment compensation only, were set up in Dearborn and Ecorse.

Lawn Clinic Set at C'ville

Recent Career Conferences Well Received

The career conferences, sponsored by the Farmington Chamber of Commerce and the F.H.S. Guidance Department, were evaluated as very successful.

The survey, taken in hostessrooms March 5, disclosed that, in general, the conferences were well done. There were few adverse comments from the students.

The counselors felt that the program was worthwhile because 1.) the information given stimulates the students to a more active concern in making vocational choices, 2.) interest was evident by attendance, attention given, and comments; and 3.) the quality of the speakers earned the profession as well as the program.

Out of the 435 students who filled out evaluation blanks, the number attending at least one conference was 318. The actual attendance was 103 because some students attended more than one conference.

The students were greatly in favor of having career conferences again next year. The vote was 222 to 12, with some seniors not voting.

The counselors suggested that the conferences be held in rooms other than the gym next year. Also, if the plans were started soon, the speakers would have more time for preparation.

Another suggestion was that the conferences be started earlier. In this way, they would not conflict with pre-registration, gym rooms, and free homeroom could be alternated with the career conferences. M.D.

NEWS of Farmington Business

LEO ADLER, Detroit auto dealer, has opened a new lot at 28315 Grand River between Middlebelt and Eight Mile Road that will feature the Volkswagen, a model imported from Germany. Harry Goldberg, long affiliated with auto sales in the Detroit area is manager of the new lot.

HINMELSPACH DAIRY has passed its state tests to qualify for the new Grade A rating for milk. Only a couple of the smaller dairies in the Detroit area have passed these exacting tests, and none of the bigger dairies have yet. Actualy Hinmelspach's have been selling Grade A quality milk for quite awhile.

These tests are conducted on a statewide basis by the Department of Agriculture.

Joe Hinmelspach started in the dairy business in Farmington Jan. 21, 1921 on Gill Road, later moved to the building now occupied by Johnson's Grocery. In 1933 they moved to the present building, which has since been enlarged considerably.

The dairy is known as one of the best in this area, and has facilities to care for not only its own large volume, but the dairy is already bottling for other smaller dairies and will likely do more of this as milk handling restrictions are enforced.

KENN LOMIS is engaged in an important move for his insurance business at 12284 Farmington Road. He has moved the general insurance office to the center portion of the same building, but it is an event even more interesting than that.

The building has undergone considerable remodeling, and some remains. He and "Gee" Roberts are particularly proud of the new insurance quarters. In the former quarters on the south end of the building is a new Farmington firm, Clifford Travel Agency. There will be three office rooms on the north soon ready, and a new entrance has been built for a large room in the basement. There will be a new display sign outside soon, too.

Twenty years ago Mr. Loomis moved into that house. At that time he was working out of the Penobscot Building in Detroit, and Farmington was "way out in the country." Later he moved his insurance office into the garage here, then about 1951 built the addition which housed the office until recently. Three years ago the Loomises moved to their new home on Wilmarth, and the Farmington head building became commercial only.

Mr. Loomis has seen great changes take place in 20 years. He remembers that in 1938 he had the first FIDA mortgage granted in Farmington. He could then look out the window at actual farming operations going on at the old Warner farm. Now there's some 250 homes in Warner Farms Subdivision.
