Prof. to Speak on International Relations at Public Meet, March 27

Professor Andrei Labanov-Rostovsky will speak on "International Relations in the Far East, Russia and Middle Europe" at the March 27th meeting of the American Association of University Women. All are cordially invited to attend.

Andrei Labanov-Rostovsky, professor of history at the University of Michigan was born in Yokohama, Japan, in 1894 and was educated in Russia and France.

He has been lecturing and teaching in the United States since 1930 and has been a naturalized citizen of this country since 1938. He joined the faculty of the University of California in 1939 and remained there until 1942 when he accepted the appointment of professor of history at the University of Michigan. Professor Labanov has also lectured extensively for other universities throughout the country.

During World War I, he served with both the Russian and French Armies, and after the Armistice joined the General Staff in South Russia. Prior to coming to this country, he was recognized abroad as a journalist and a lecturer.

Professor Labanov has contributed articles to numerous periodicals and has written several books. His latest volumes are "The Grinding Wheel" published in 1935, and "Russia and Europe" published and published in 1947 and "Russia and Europe 1725-28" published in 1954.

The professor is a member of the American Historical Association, the American Association of University Professors, the Institute of Historical Research (London), and the Foreign Press Association (London). He is also a recipient of the ancient Russian Orders of St. Anne, St. Stanislaus, and St. Vladimir.

The meeting will be at the Farmington Junior High School at 8:00 p.m., Thursday, March 27.
