

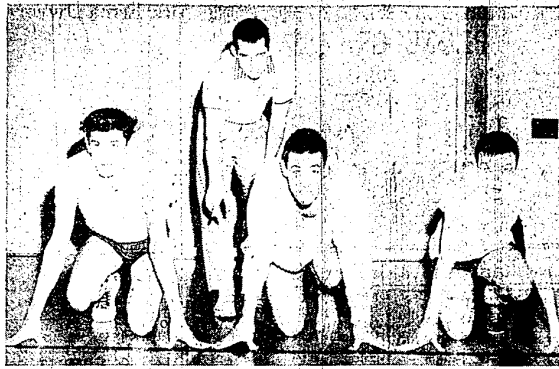
CHS Track Team Short on 'Vets'

Track Season Opened Last Week; 31 Hopefuls Answer First Call

The 1938 track season officially began Monday, March 17, with 31 boys out for the first practice. More are expected to come in the days to follow. Mr. Gene Freed especially requested that a manager come to the meet.

Six of the 31 boys now out are returning lettermen from the '37 track season. They are Dewey Nichols, Roy Jordan, Ken Cowley, Jim Marsh, Mike Agee and Tom Peckham. Rex (Warren) Cowley set two records and assisted in setting one other last year. He broke the old High Hurdle record with a 15.4 seconds new record, and also set a new Low Hurdle record of 20.6 seconds. Cowley, along with Al LeSage, Mike Agee, and Bob Brewbaker set a Medley Relay record by running the course in 2:38 minutes. An 850 Relay record was also set.

Baseball Practice Well Underway; 1st Game April 18

Spring training is well under way for the 1938 Falcons baseball team with all the possible prospects working under the watchful eyes of Coach Warren Piche. Practice began last Monday for baseball hopefuls that were not asked to report sooner because of winter sports participation. The first baseman, Bob Uley, with his very respectable .310 batting average from last year, will be called upon this year for heavy work.
