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Cost for New Grade School Down Somewhat

Last week the Farmington School Board and the Citizens Advisory Board and the Citizens Advisory Building Sub-committee experienced the culmination of five months of work with the opening of bids for an elementary school in Section 22 in the township at Power Road and Alma.

It appears possible, dependent upon the architects appraisal of the bidders, that this new school can be built for approximately \$254,000. This is considerably less than it has cost to put up schools of similar size and construction in the past. The school is equivalent to the Cloverdale School, now under construction for approximately \$419,000, except that there is an additional kindergarten room in the school to be built in Section 22. Officials of the Citizens Advisory Committee attributed the savings of approximately \$65,000 between the two buildings to two factors—economics in design and to the building climate which now prevails.

The decision to depend on fluorescent lighting rather than a combination of fluorescent and natural lighting made it possible to eliminate the top lighting in the new building and to minimize the use of glass in the exterior walls.
