We visited the State Highway Department in Lansing last week to get first hand information regarding highways in our township. We were cordially received by the commissioner and his route and planning engineers. We left there happy with the thought that everyone in the township would be given all the people who might be affected by the 11 Mile Expressway an opportunity to present their views prior to drawing of the permanent plan or purchasing right-of-way. A public hearing will be held in the township in the very near future and all residents of the township will make a spot check of properties along the proposed route with a view to interchanges, land locked acreage, service roads and minimum cost.
