The Farmington Branch of the American Cancer Society announced this week that two films vital to the health of women will be shown April 23 at 8 p.m. at the Farmington Junior High. The films to be shown are "Time and Two Women" and "Breast Self Examination."

Any one of these seven danger signals can mean cancer, but only

1. Unusual bleeding or discharge.
2. A lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere.
3. A sore that does not heal.
4. Change in bowel or bladder habits.
5. Hoarseness or coughing.
6. Indigestion or difficulty in swallowing.
7. Change in a wart or mole.
