of today's farm family. That's why the successful farmers are having to expand their acreage in addition to investing in the latest mechanical implements and chemical aids.

The successful farmer also must keep in touch with new developments in seeds, cultivation methods, irrigation possibilities — in other words with the advancing science of agriculture. Otherwise he simply cannot compete in the food and fiber market, and he must be satisfied with a subsistence or find a better, non-farming occupation.

End Government Supports
The CED program is designed to withdraw all forms of Government price supports, acreage allotments and market controls — gradually as the acreage and manpower is reduced. The CED says the cost of its recommended program "can be expected to be considerable, but probably less than the present — futile — outlays at the outset, but can also be expected to taper off and end or reach a very low maintenance level."

The American people, everyday citizens, must move in on the present wasteful farm program. With taxpayers being called upon to finance a record \$40 billion annual expenditure for the Communist military threat, we must quickly halt the \$5 billion outlay which in the long run is helping no one.
