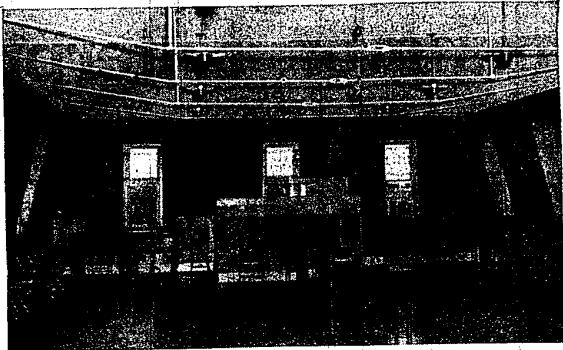


Awarded Degree

THE OLD GRACE HOTEL, an active business place in Farmington during the early part of the century, is now beginning to take on an entirely new look as the result of an extensive remodeling program begun by the Farmington Elk's Temple Association which purchased the building in October of last year. Remodeling of the third floor, the scene of many lively Friday night dances between 1910 and 1925, into a modern meeting place for local Elk members was recently completed (as shown above). Work is now well underway on remodeling projects on portions of the first and second floor.
 Constructed in 1907, nearly all of the materials for the building came from the immediate

area. The blocks for the building were made by hand at the site with the gravel used being drawn from a pit on Haggerty Road near Grand River. Lumber for the building came from a wooded farm site at Inkster Road and 7 Mile and was prepared for use in the building at a wood-working mill located just east of the hotel site. Wallace Hatton did both the preparing of the finish wood and the plumbing in the building.
 Several workers on the old Detroit Inter-urban line running from Detroit to Farmington (including motormen, conductors and linemen) roomed at the hotel in its early years, former owner Clarence Grace recalled.

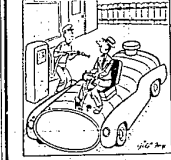

Annexation
 To the Editor:
 How far can a community stray from the accepted concepts of a democracy? Bewildered home owners of Heather Hills and Woodcroft Subdivisions summoned to an annexation meeting at the Farmington City Hall, Wednesday, March 26th, by a letter from City Manager Earl P. Scherffius, delinquent, are beginning to wonder if Communism and the police state may not be just around the corner.
 Announced as the first of a series of meetings, it led to very little dissemination of general information in any way reassuring to the Township dwellers. Perhaps the meeting was called a little too early even for the experts on the panel! There was a deal of talk about street paving, sidewalks, lights, sewer and water and the advantage of better police and fire protection from the City Manager but no answers on the matter of financing or a possible raise in the tax rate over the present township figure.
 Mrs. Richardson of Heather Hills and Earl Lathrup of Woodcroft Subdivision asked many pertinent questions which were answered by generalities. Charles F. Brown who also attended the meeting left early.
 If City Manager Scherffius wanted the meeting to be attended by persons with a "chip on the shoulder" it seemed to us he went out of his way to produce the effect. There may be advantages for both sides in this program, but the emotional impact of such high-handed tactics will effectively block any unbiased discussion. At least it would seem so to us.

Police Handle 522 Complaints

During the month of March the Farmington Township police department traveled 8,707 miles on police duties and answered a total of 522 counter complaints, according to a month-end report issued by Police Chief Irving Yakes.
 The biggest single activity of the department during the month was the investigation of 29 larceny cases and 20 summons were also issued by officers.
 Patrolmen were called out to handle nine auto accidents during the month, all but one of which were property damage accidents. The injuries suffered in the other accident were of only a minor nature, the police chief added.
 "Thirteen cases of breaking and entering were handled and nine cases of malicious destruction of property. A total of ten dog bite cases were also investigated.
 During the month, ten minors were apprehended by township patrolmen in possession of beer.
