

# Scout-O-Rama Plans Completed

Selecting a name for the new Lutheran Church at Kendallwood Subdivision will be one of the major items of business this coming Sunday as the group meets in another of its series of formative meetings.

The name will be announced to the public shortly after the meeting. The meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. at the home of Mrs. Wilbert Abram, 28109 Thornay Brae.

The new church is conducting worship services temporarily in the Woodside Elementary School, at the end of Peppermill Road, beginning at 10:30 a.m. every Sunday.

The first services were highly successful from the standpoint of attendance, stated the Rev. Carl Mehl, pastor. Sunday School and Vacation Bible School are in the formative stages at the present time and plans are being made for the establishment of Men's Club, Ladies' Guild, and Youth Group.

The mission was actually started behind the scenes two years ago by the Mission Board of the Lutheran Church in Missouri Synod, at which time the area was canvassed and property purchased next to the O. E. Donckel Junior High School.

The planning was continued until such time as it was considered feasible to build the first unit of an over-all church, school, and parish hall program. The Board is now ready to begin this building program.

The Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod, numbering over 2,900,000 souls, is sponsor of the "Lutheran Hour," the nation's largest radio broadcast. It also sponsors what national magazines have called "TV's spiritual hit," "This is the Life." It is represented in the metropolitan Detroit area by over 100 churches.

## Keeping Typhoon Chasers Flying

Airman Third Class Cecil C. Beebe Jr. recently reported "typoon chasers" duty with the "Typhoon Chasers" of the 5th Weather Reconnaissance Squadron. He has been assigned duties in the 50th maintenance section.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil C. Beebe Sr., 22776 Floral Avenue, Farmington.

Airman Beebe's squadron gained their reputation as typhoon chasers in detecting and tracking a yearly average of 17 of the tropical storms. Typhoons are identical to their Caribbean counterpart, the hurricane, the only difference between the two storms being their location in regard to the international date line.

The typhoon breeding grounds lay to the south of Guam in the Pacific near the equator. The squadron's 5 1/2 million square mile area of responsibility extends from the equator north to the 28th parallel and from the international date line westward to the China Sea.

The extreme turbulence encountered in the hazardous typhoon hunting demands that the squadron's WB-50 (W for weather) aircraft be in top flying condition. Mechanics like Airman Beebe have the responsibility of insuring that the four-engine bombers receive that necessary maintenance.

The Michigan airman attended Farmington High School until 1957. He entered the Air Force in July 1957 and attended technical school at Chanute AFB, Illinois, prior to coming to Guam.
