

Two Area Seniors Win 4-Year Ford Motor Co. Scholarships

Two from this area were among 70 high school seniors to be awarded four year college scholarships by the Ford Motor Company Fund as a result of 1958 competition, it was disclosed Monday. Area winners were Judith A. Cook of Farmington High and Cynthia Jennifer Beerboom of Clarenceville High. Henry Ford II, president of the Fund, officially notified the winners by telegram on Easter Sunday and extended his congratulations and "best wishes for a happy and successful future." The scholarships, which are awarded to sons and daughters of Ford employees, provide for payment of all tuition and academic fees plus 80 per cent of normal living costs up to a maximum of \$750 a year for students away from home and \$300 a year for those living at home. Miss Cook's father, Robert B. Cook of 3377 Macomb, Farmington, is a manufacturing engineer at the Rouge plant in Dearborn and Mrs. Beerboom's mother, Mrs. Regina Cynthia Beerboom of 20201 Gillman, Livonia, is employed at the Ford Division central parts depot in Livonia. The 70 scholarship winners are from 11 states with the largest number, 28, from Michigan, Ford officials disclosed. The Bishop's Company will present in their striking new production "Saint Joan" at the N. It is a message that is relevant to the weak and the strong, every Sunday morning. Named for Bishop Gerald Kennedy of the Bishop's Company, is a professional group dedicated to drama-in-the-church. The Company is an independent organization, founded by Phyllis Beecher Beard. The Company has played continuously since its founding in Southern California in 1952, and is now on its fifth National tour. Its plays have been presented in schools, churches, colleges, and institutions in thirty-five states. It has appeared as part of the World Council of Churches at Evanston, Ill., in the promotion of the World Council of Churches at Washington, D. C. Last summer's itinerary included the first of the tour at Princeton Seminary and 45 performances in Eastern colleges.

Sixth Graders Begin Making Visits To Junior Highs They Will Attend

Sixth grade classrooms from the various elementary schools in the Farmington School District began their annual Visitation Days to the Farmington Junior High School on Tuesday, April 8. Each day, continuing through April 17, one sixth grade classroom will be attending each of the two junior high schools. The purpose of the Visitation Day is to provide each sixth grade student with an opportunity to visit the junior high school which they will likely attend the following school year and to acquaint them with the general characteristics of the junior high school program. During the visitation period at the two junior high schools Mr. Byron Oliver and Mr. Jerry Spink, junior high principals, will provide each respective sixth grade classroom opportunity to: 1. Tour the building with visits to the gym, shop, home-making room, vocal music room, band room, mechanical drawing room, library, and art room. 2. Visit a Home Room. 3. Participate in an academic classroom. Their visit will be concluded by a meeting with the building principal. Following lunch the sixth grade students will return to their respective elementary buildings. The final phase of the program, Parents' Night, will be held on Tuesday, April 22, in the cafeteria of the Dunckel Junior High School, starting at 8:00 p.m. Parents of all sixth grade children are invited to attend. Local Announces Annual Meeting

A \$326,000 expansion of Farmington's Greenleaf telephone exchange is now underway, local Michigan Bell Telephone Company Manager John Kamega disclosed Monday. The first phase of the expansion program will be the construction of an addition to the Greenleaf exchange building on Cedar River in the city of Farmington to make more room for dial equipment, Kamega said. Work has already been started on the new building. The local-exchange has already been expanded twice to provide "central" facilities for more phones. However, floor space at the building is not adequate to contain further expansion, he added. To measure 100 by 62 feet, the new addition will be completed by the end of this year. The addition will be one story high with a full basement. The Wallace-Aldinger Company, Detroit, are contractors for the job, designed by Giffels & Vallet.

(Continued from Page 1A) arms, trunks, or feeders whereby lines could be made to help pay, and which assessment district would receive the benefit of the sewer lines. The sewer lines which may be left over from the intercepter: 6. What is the estimated cost per lineal foot of frontage for subdividing sewer lines in a hilly subdivision; 7. Will the people who live in the Township areas with the most urgent sanitary needs of sewers be able to pay for sewers; 8. Who will foot the bill if the sewer system does not pay for itself; 9. What is the probable extent of the building boom which will hit our Township with the advent of the sewer, and specifically, is there danger that the building boom will result in a lowering of the water table so that it will also be burdened with bringing water from Lake Huron; 10. Will it be necessary, in order to get help to pay for the sewer, to abandon the 20 thousand square foot minimum in Residential Zoning; 11. Will land developers have greater incentive to try court action to break such zoning; 12. Will the building boom bring a population favoring sidewalks, street lights and other costly facilities common to city communities; 13. Will the building boom put schools on half-day sessions, for years or even decades; 14. Will there be an increase in school taxes, will index an increase in school taxes be the biggest cost of the sewer; 15. What affect will sewer construction have on the scenic beauty of our valleys; 16. Approximately how many Township residents have been victimized in their purchase of a home site and are in dire need of sewer; 17. Is there a health hazard making a sewer system mandatory; 18. Does there exist an adequate alternative to the traditional type of sewer, in the sewage treatment tanks, both individual and community, developed in the Southwest and used by our Armed Forces; 19. With patience wearing thin and nerves at the point of breaking, a concluding motion giving the Township Board authority to make recommendations in the revised budget as it saw fit to make it balance was almost unanimously approved and the meeting adjourned.

(Continued from Page 1A) Lomerson conceded that improper grading could be causing some of the troubles on this and other "local" roads as a general statement that he would point this out to the maintenance department. Questioned on why the township had not proceeded with a proposal to purchase its own road equipment and have it readily available for county workers to cooperate here, Supervisor Frank Stephenson stated that legal action had been given that such action is not legal. It was pointed out that the two other townships in the county which had done something similar earlier one has already abandoned the plan as unworkable and sold their equipment. In a concluding statement, Commissioner Lomerson indicated that he or other officials of the County Road Commission would be glad to meet with groups in the township to discuss specific road problems and possible solutions at any time. APPEARING at the meeting to discuss the proposed 1 1/2 mile township road across the superhighway route were the following: John Williams of the Redford Branch Office of the State Highway Department emphasized the fact that the route presently called for may still be changed but has been determined to be the best route to follow in planning done this far. Actual construction is not scheduled to start until the last quarter of 1960, he pointed out. He assured concerned parties that their objections to the presently proposed route would be heard and considered and invited them to visit his office to discuss details. Since Federal funds will be used for construction of the highway, surveys at which time officials of the Federal Bureau of Roads will hear all objections and give consideration to possible alternate routes that might be proposed, he concluded.
