Local Troop's Orange Crate Canoe To Be Featured at Scout-O-Rama

The art of building a usable canoe out of orange crates — and almost anyone can do it — will be revealed at one of the eye-catching booths at the fifth annual Scout-O-Rama slated for Saturday and Sunday, April 26 and 27, at Walled Lake Senior High School.

This astounding orange crate canoe will be built on the spot by Explorers of Troop 109 of Farmington. Outdoor sportsmen will be attracted to this demonstration.

Another outstanding feature will be the Boys Republic Post 111 of Farmington's exhibit in zoology. This exhibit could be classified in a miniature since it will display live muskrats, fox, racoon, skunks, wild rabbits, porcupine, many types of Michigan snakes (including the rattler), along with the box constructor from Louisiana and a prairie rattler from Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico. There will also be other types of animals, including bear, cub, and other types of reptiles, including a 3-foot alligator from Florida.

The Scout-O-Rama show will be continuing from 2 until 9:30 p.m. on April 26 and from 2 until 6 p.m. on April 27. This year marks the first time that the event was scheduled for more than one day, and indication of its growth and popularity.

Produced by more than 2400 Cubs, Scouts and Explorers of the Ottawa District of the Clinton Valley Council with the help of 700 adult leaders, the Scout-O-Rama of 1958 will offer an interesting "midway" of 50 exhibits.

This "midway" carries out the theme "Scouting in Action" in all phases.

Safety will be emphasized in a cycling exhibit staged by Post 108 Explorers of Walled Lake. The exhibit will instruct onlookers in how to use, maintain and repair a bicycle.

There will be many exhibits featuring fly tying, metal work, rope and knot-making, signaling, bike-making, Indian lore, pioneer, first aid, finger printing, safety and conservation.

A booth sponsored by Waite's Department Store of Pontiac will display all types of Scouting equipment and supplies.

Full-scale camping will be demonstrated outside the school by Troop 112 of Walled Lake.

A special attraction will be a presentation of a stellar 9-act stage show at 3:30 p.m. and 8:15 p.m. on April 26 and at 4:00 p.m. April 27. Talent for the show was carefully selected from a host of Scouts from the Ottawa District.

The stage performance will offer 30 minutes of solid entertainment. The all-Scout cast lists nearly 100 performers.

A total of 25,000 tickets are now being sold by Scouts of all ages throughout the Ottawa District which covers the southwestern section of Oakland County.
