

Pre-Registration of Kindergarten Youngsters Scheduled May 14, 15

Registration of pre-school age youngsters who will be eligible to attend kindergarten in the fall will be conducted at all elementary schools in the Farmington Public School District on Wednesday and Thursday, May 14th and 15th. Hours of registration will be from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 to 3 p.m. on Wednesday and from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. and 6 to 8 p.m. on Thursday. Parents who are eligible to start kindergarten in the Farmington school system in September, a child must be five years of age prior to December 1, 1958. PARENTS of children who were

residents of the school district in May, 1957, and whose names appear on the school census will be sent individual notices indicating the time and place of registration and school record to be completed. Parents who were not yet residents in May, 1957, but who will have a child or children eligible to start kindergarten in September are asked to contact the office at the elementary school nearest them for information. Recent action taken by the Oakland County Child Accounting Dept. requires that a birth certificate be

submitted at the time of registration and that a hospital certificate will not be sufficient, school officials emphasized. The legal information required is: (1) name of child, (2) name of father, (3) maiden name of mother, (4) place of birth of child and (5) date of birth of child. REQUESTS for birth certificates for children born in Oakland County should be addressed to the County Clerk, Oakland County Court House, Huron St. and Saginaw St., Pontiac. Certificates for children born in Wayne County

may be obtained from the County Clerk, 201 City County Building, Detroit 26, and for children born in the City of Detroit from the Board of Health, 314 City County Building, Detroit 26. Pre-registration at this time is vital to the efficient operation of the school program. Total registration at this time enables school officials to accurately determine teacher and room needs and to effectively assign children to schools and rooms, it was pointed out. Describe Play As 'Peek Into A Penthouse'

More of a peek into a penthouse than a parade past a picture window is one description of "Present Laughter," the Noel Coward comedy now in rehearsal at the Farmington Players' Barn. It has been suggested that the story of "Present Laughter" may be autobiographical. This is doubtful, however, because it is more the type of story told about someone else than about the author himself. Or perhaps that is why Noel Coward has never admitted that it is his own life. Garry Essendine, the main character of the story, played by Gerry Giguere, is a successful actor who carries his acting into his personal life with more enthusiasm than discretion. As has sometimes been known to happen in real life, he is teased by women. His attempts to escape them are mostly verbal. The action becomes reminiscent of some of the tangled affairs we see from time to time in the life of an associate wife, a sharp tongued secretary and a young man trying to sell a play. The real life affairs would be much more interesting if Noel Coward projected the dialogue.

Mrs. Martha Weber, Players' production manager estimates that more than 1200 man hours of effort will be spent in rehearsals, stage and scenery erection, collecting properties and the other preparations for the presentation of "Present Laughter" May 16, 17, 23 and 24 at the "Barn" at 22330 Twelve Mile Road.
