Cawley, Agee Spark F. H. S. Track Victories

Rex Cawley of Farmington set another track record Monday afternoon as the Falcon track team defeated Cody High of Detroit, 57 and one sixth — 51 and five sixths. Cawley ran the 120 yard dash in 15.2, surpassing his own record set against Wayne two weeks ago. He also won the 180 yard hurdle in 20.0 while Dewey Nichols and Tom Peckham took second and third.

Mike Agee of Farmington won the 100 yard dash in 10.8 and the 200 yard dash in 23.3.

Iskra of Cody won the mile in 4:48.5 with Jim Marsh of Farmington running second.

Cody dominated the 440 yard dash as Pieper, Sluka, and Riske, all of Cody, finished 1-2-3.

Cody also won the medley relay and 880 yard run. Falcons Ed Fulton and Larry Wright finished second and third in the 880.

In the field events, Cody took first in the broad jump, with 20 feet 10 inches, taking second. The shot put was won by Rulick of Cody, with 47' 3", followed by Frank Clappison and Jack Lavigne of Farmington.

Cawley won the high jump with 5' 10". Peckham took second with 5' 8", and Roy Jordan and Dave Nichols of Farmington and Gonski of Cody tying for third at 5' 6".

Dewey Nichols and Gensak and Rulick of Cody tied for first in the pole vault at 9' 9".

The deciding event of the meet, the 880 yard relay, was won by Farmington, setting a school record. Mike Agee, Tom Grimsshaw, Dave Catherman, and Rex Cawley ran the course in 1:35.6.

The Falcons' next meet will be this afternoon at 4:30 p.m. at Waterloo. Next Tuesday they will have a meet at Redford Union at 7:00 p.m. R.S.
