How Is Annual Meeting Action Invalidated?

Dear Sir:

Some very important news concerning Farmington Township appeared in the Sunday, April 20 issue of the Detroit News. To my surprise I learned that two motions which were passed at the annual Township meeting had been invalidated by an error made by the Township Clerk.

The two motions referred to are: (1) the act requesting the Township Board to reduce the budget by \$25,000 and (2) the act requesting the Township Board to answer certain vital questions concerning the proposed new sewer.

I have read the Farmington Enterprise weekly and yet I did not see any reference to this news. I wonder why I had to learn of this from an out-of-town newspaper and why this information was not made public for three weeks. Also I would like to know what the error was that invalidated the votes.

If the error is in the form of a technicality, the board still has a moral responsibility to attempt to reduce the budget and to answer the questions concerning the sewer because it was obvious that a majority of those present at the meeting requested this.

Another alarming piece of news obtained from this article is that our Township Supervisor is attempting to eliminate the annual Township meeting. This certainly is not democratic when there is a strong interest in the annual meetings. In fact it is suggestive of the methods used by some ex-dictators. When they could not meet the opposition they had it eliminated.

Hear How Seeds Combat 'Reds'

Combating communism with common garden seed was described at the April 22 meeting of the Farmington Kiwanis Club.

A. E. Mozier, of Los Angeles, California, explained the garden seed project as a practical means of reducing famine and poor nutrition in areas threatened by Soviet influence.

Mr. Mozier has traveled around the world several times, distributing seeds in places where hungry people have had to eat their own seed to avoid immediate starvation.

Several Local Scouts to Perform In Big Scout-O-Rama Program

A record - smashing crowd of more than 20,000 is expected at Walled Lake Senior High School this week - end to find out what's inside of a surprise package known as the 5th Annual Scout-O-Rama.

The show will be in progress from 2 until 9:30 p.m. Saturday, and from 2 until 6 p.m. on Sunday. More than 2000 Cubs, Scouts and Explorers and 700 Adult leaders of the Ottawa District of the Clinton Valley Council have been packing entertainment and education into their prize package for the past several months.

Much of the entertainment will be wrapped up in a 50 minute Stage Show that will feature nearly 100 performers - all Scouts from the Ottawa District.

A feature act will be the Blackfoot Indian Dance, a presentation of Troop 42 of White Lake Township. Ten boys, dressed in colorful, hand-made costumes will participate in an authentic ritual of the Blackfoot Indian Tribe.

Inasmuch as an Indian Dance is stage for a specific purpose (to hail the advent of war, for instance), the boys will be delivering a message with their various gestures. The group learned facts about the Blackfoot Indian from Chief Blackhawk, a member of the White Lake Unit.

Also billed as a four - star act is "Mrs. Jordan's Dancing School", which amounts to a ballet of comedy. Graceful in their movements, the Boy Scouts from Troop 110 of Farmington may leave you with the

theme of "Scouting in Action". The many exhibits present actual demonstrations of Scouting projects. Earl L. Gruber, General Chairman of the Scout-O-Rama Production, said today that this fifth annual show promises to be the best of the series, and that although tickets are being sold only by Cubs, Scouts and Explorers, the general public may also secure tickets at the door. Gruber also pointed out that this year, as in the past, the full cooperation of the local police and fire departments is being received for the safety and protection of the public.

B. Resolution re: Changes in State Trunkline Designations as Requested by Michigan State Highway Department. Motion made by Barber and supported by Cavanaugh to adopt the following resolution:

RESOLUTION OF APPROVAL FOR STATE TRUNKLINE CHANGES IN THE CITY OF FARMINGTON
WHEREAS, the State Highway Commissioner of the State of Michigan has requested approval of the City of Farmington, of the changes by him, of that part of State trunkline highways US-10 and US-16 East Bound (shown on the attached sketch map) bearing State Highway Department approval, adopted April 4, 1958, lying wholly within the corporate limits of said city;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved:

(1) That the approval and consent of the City of Farmington is and is hereby given for the establishment as state trunkline highway, the location described as follows:

Commencing on the south limits of the City of Farmington on Nine Mile Road at a point west of Maple Grove Avenue, thence northwesterly through Farmington on a new location adjacent to the present route of US-16 East Bound, to Gill Street the west city limits of Farmington (.8 mile approx.)

(2) That the approval and consent of the City of Farmington is and is hereby given to the abandonment of the state-trunkline highway described as follows: The Commencing on the present route of US-16 East Bound, the so called Farmington Cut-Off, on the South limits of the City of Farmington, thence northwesterly on the present route of US-16 East Bound through the section to the west limits of Farmington (.0.9 mile approx.)

WHEREAS, the State Highway Commissioner has agreed to the retaining of the present route of old US-16 on Grand River Avenue in Farmington as a business route connecting the City of Farmington and the new expressway and to be designated on the State trunkline system.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council will take over the aforesaid street as part of the city street system.

A. Uniform Traffic Ordinance for Adoption. Motion made by Cavanaugh and supported by Bates to adopt and enact the following ordinance:
ORDINANCE NO. C 116-58
An ordinance to adopt by reference the Uniform Traffic Code for Michigan Cities, Townships and Villages.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDINANCES

Section 1. CODE ADOPTED. The Uniform Traffic Code for cities, townships and villages promulgated by the Commissioner of State Police on February 14, 1958, and published in Supplement No. 13, Michigan Administrative Code, pp 5 to 37, in accordance with Public Act 62 of 1956, State of Michigan, is hereby adopted by reference as in this ordinance modified.

Section 2. REFERENCES IN CODE. References in the Uniform Traffic Code for Michigan Cities, Townships and Villages to "any ordinance" shall mean the City of Farmington.

Section 3. NOTICE TO BE PUBLISHED. The City Clerk shall publish this ordinance in the manner required by law and shall cause the same to be published in supplementary notice setting forth the purpose of the said Uniform Traffic Code and of the fact that complete copies of the Code are available at the office of the Clerk for inspection by and distribution to the public at all times.

Section 4. CONFLICTING ORDINANCES REPEALED. Ordinance No. C-23-48 adopted June 2, 1948, and all amendments thereto, relating to traffic, is hereby specifically repealed. All other ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of the Uniform Traffic Code are, to the extent of such inconsistency, hereby repealed.

Section 5. WHEN EFFECTIVE. The Uniform Traffic Code will be in effect in this governmental unit 10 days after the passage of this adopting ordinance.
