BPW Cited for Good Done Through Community Well Baby Clinic Project

The Northland Chapter of the Dale Carnegie Club International has named the Farmington Business and Professional Women's Club as recipient of a special certificate for its contribution of time and effort in promoting better human relations in the community through its Well Baby Clinic project.

This week the Northland Chapter whose members reside in Farmington, Plymouth, Wayne, Livonia, and the surrounding areas is joining other Dale Carnegie Club International chapters throughout the United States, Canada and in some foreign countries in observance of "Good Human Relations Week."

In 1933, the Health and Safety Committee of the Farmington BPW Club were looking for a worthwhile project. After much investigation, the club decided to sponsor, under the direction of the Oakland County Health Dept., a clinic to function primarily to keep Farmington's City and Township pre-schoolers well. This involved the process of medical examination, immunizations, prescriptions, vitamins, and occasionally a child would be referred to another clinic for further examination.

The clinic met twice a month under the direction of a doctor, and an O. C. Health nurse. Volunteer workers from BPW and other sources took on the responsibility of providing gowns for examinations, laundering of them, providing toys, making appointments, keeping records, taking temperatures, along with many other duties that made for a successful project.

In 1954, for tax purposes, the Farmington Business and Professional Women's Foundation was chartered as a non-profit organization. The clinic is held the first and third Monday of each month in the basement of the Salem Evangelical Church from 8:30 a.m. until all the children visiting the clinic have had an opportunity to see the doctor. The nurse conferences the mothers on good health habits, and proper diet for her children.

After five years of operation, there are approximately 800 children that have received physical examinations. Needless to say, the immunizations given have helped in having a healthier, happier group of children starting off to kindergarten.
