and no municipality would be required to become a part of the Authority or be assessed a portion of the cost of construction for bringing water into the area from Lake Huron.

Question: Will it be necessary, in order to get help to pay for the sewer, to abandon the twenty thousand square foot minimum in residential Zone 4, or will land developers have greater incentive to try court action to break such zoning?

Answer: In our opinion, it will not be necessary to introduce any zoning restrictions in order to pay for the system. As to the second part of the question, it involves points of law which we are not qualified to answer.

Question: Will the building boom bring a population favoring sidewalks, street lights and other costly facilities common to clified communities?

Answer: It is presumed that some of the citizens desire such facilities now and will continue to do so in the future. We cannot second guess the desires of the present population any more than we can future population. These matters are a matter of Township Board decision after request of the citizens.

Question: Will the building boom put our schools on half day sessions for years or even decades?

Answer: This question we refer to the school administrators since we have no knowledge of the present situation in regards to schools.

Question: Will there be an increase in school taxes, will, indeed, an increase in school taxes be the biggest cost of the sewer?

Answer: The taxpayers in a school district themselves vote additional school taxes and not this department and again we have no knowledge of the type or size of schools desired now or which will be desired in the future. Certainly all school needs cannot be tied to this project since the Township has and will continue to experience growth in population. It is just as reasonable to assume that with adequate sanitary sewers that some industrial and commercial development will take place that would not have otherwise taken place. This type of growth makes no demands on schools and provides a tax base to relieve the burden on the individual homeowner.

Question: What effect will sewer construction have on the scenic beauty of our valleys?

Answer: None! Within nine months after construction no one will be able to notice any evidence of the sewer. To prove this point, there are already sewers constructed in the valleys in other areas which show no visible evidence.

Question: Approximately how many Township residents have been victimized in their purchase of a home site and are in dire need of sewers?

Answer: We refer this question to the Township Board as Building Inspector for answer if such a condition exists.

Question: Is there a health hazard making a sewer system mandatory?

Answer: We would refer you to the comments of the Township Health Officer regarding this matter.

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
