In the first match with Bloomfield Hills the score was 217-178. The members of the C.H.S. team are comparatively young and the lack of experience accounts somewhat for the score. Coach Bill Waters pointed out. One member of the Bloomfield Hills golf team placed third in state competition last year, he added.

Redford Union won the second meet, 213-184. On April 23, C.H.S. golf team played and lost to Garden City. The final score was 209-215. Tony Cassie was low point man for Clarencville.

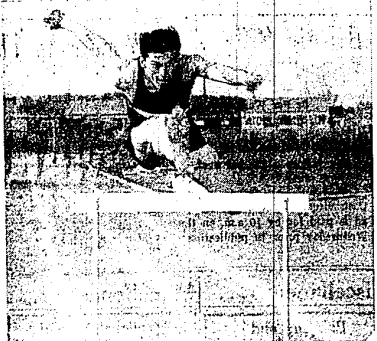
On Friday, April 25, Clarencville scrimmaged Allen Park and Tony Cassie, Dick Wiley, Forrest Fennell, and Doug Wilcox comprised the team for the practice session.

The most recent match was a contest with Brighton High. The Trojan golfers lost by a score of 207-214. Low man for C.H.S. was Forrest Fennell with a 46.

The C.H.S. team this year is comprised of one senior, Doug Wilcox; three juniors, Tony Cassie, Dick Wiley, and Jerry Hoffmeyer; one sophomore, Gary Campbell; and three freshmen, Forrest Fennell, James Cassie, and Ricky Stevens.

Top man on the team is Tony Cassie; Dick Wiley is in second place; Forrest Fennell is in third, and Doug Wilcox is in fourth. James Cassie has also played on the team.

### Track Records Being Set Weekly

New track records are being set weekly by stellar performing Falcon trackmen Rex Crawley and Mike Agee.

More are sure to be set if these two boys as well as other members of the varsity squad continue to show improvement as they have in the past. Coach Gene Freed commented.

An all-around track performer, Crawley began his record setting spree earlier in the season and has continued to set new school and district records in each meet since his latest accomplishment was performed last Saturday when he established new records in both the high and low hurdle events in the Central Michigan College Relays. He captured the title in the high hurdle event running in a record-breaking time of 14.45 seconds and the low hurdles event with a time of 19.65 seconds.

In league competition, Crawley set school records earlier in the season by running the low hurdles event in a time of 15 seconds and the high hurdles in another record time of 20 seconds flat.

Other school records set by Crawley so far this year have been in the 200 yard dash which he ran in a time of 22.5 seconds and in the high jump. He cleared 5 foot 10 inches high jumping and should easily be able to go over six feet before this season is over, Coach Freed indicated.

In the Huron Relays held earlier in the season and with 29 Class A schools in competition, Crawley captured first in the low hurdle event and ran second in the high hurdles. He also ran as anchor-man on the record smashing 880 yard relay team on the same day.

A junior, Crawley also excels in cross-country. Last year he ran fourth in league competition. Next year he will be team captain. Interested in a career in radio and television, Rex handles the school announcing system for all types of announcing. He took the lead

role in the junior play this year. Also a junior, Agee set a new school record in the 100 yard dash this season by running the distance in a time of 10.4 seconds. He has also shown well in the 230 yard dash, running second behind Crawley. Mike ran lead on the record setting 880 yard relay team and is anchor-man on the 440 yard medley relay team.

An all-around athlete, Agee plays halfback on the football team and has been a member of both the basketball and wrestling teams. Well liked by his fellow classmates, he serves on the European club and is active on numerous school committees. An honor student, he will visit Europe this summer as a foreign exchange student.

### F.H.S. Thinclads Edge Walled Lake

Farmington's varsity track team defeated Walled Lake 58-6-50 1/2 Thursday afternoon at Farmington.

Mike Agee of Farmington broke P.H.S. varsity records in the 100 yard dash and 200 yard dash, but was second to Frank Fink of Walled Lake in both races. Agee ran the 100 in 10.3 seconds, but Fink set the track record at 10.2 seconds. Agee covered 200 yards in 22.4 seconds while Fink did it in 22.2 seconds. Rex Crawley of Farmington was third with a time of 22.5 seconds.

The Falcons swept the first three places in the high hurdles as Rex Crawley set a school record with a time of 14.8 seconds. He was followed by Tom Peckham and Frank Clappison, both of Farmington.

Jim Marsh of Farmington won the mile in 4 minutes 53.5 seconds. Walled Lake trackmen Pierce and Walker won the quarter mile and half mile respectively, with Farmington's Dan Machan and Ed Fulton taking second.

Proulx of Walled Lake won the low hurdles in 21.4 seconds while Tom Grimshaw and Dewey Nichols taking second and third places.

Falcons Cawley, Peckham and Roy Jordan swept the first three places in the high jump. Frank Clappison won the shot put with a heave of 44 feet 2 inches.

Dewey Nichols won the broad jump with 19 feet 4 inches and was second in the pole vault to Fink with 10 feet 6 inches.

The Falcon trackmen will next see action when Berkley visits Farmington this afternoon at 4 p.m. May 10, the Falcons will be at the Albion Invitational at 3 a.m.

The player draft last Saturday marked the first visible signs to increase the number of major league teams in the North Farmington Little League from 4 to 6. Just as in the big leagues, there have been managers, coaches, and scouts carefully appraising the baseball talents of the boys for the past couple of weeks. Evenings and Saturdays spent slugging flies and occasionally taking a cut at a few pitches. Each one was hopeful that he had a potential star batter or pitcher that had not been noticed by the other team managers.

In addition to the players lost from last year's teams because of age limitations, there has been the expected number of move out of the area. To fill these voids there are those who stood out last year in the farm league, and also boys who have moved into the area and are trying out for the first time, officials commented. Some of the boys who have moved into the area since the last season really have been managers, coaches, and the managers enthusiastic. At least a dozen of these new boys seem a cinch to make the starting nines. From all indications several of them will be well-known before the season ends. By the end of this week all six major league teams should be pretty well lined up and the player drafts will begin for the farm teams. Once this is done the managers will begin wading their players into ball clubs ready for the serious business of league play that will begin the first part of June.

Behind the hitting of Neil Stevenson and the three-hit pitching of Roy Temple, the Falcons walloped Walled Lake 30 last Friday afternoon, May 2, on the Viking diamond.

Stevenson knocked in four runs on a triple and two doubles in four times at bat while the Falcons pounded out nine hits after a single by Le Sage in the first inning. Stevenson blasted a long triple to produce the first run of the game and provide Temple with all the help he needed to achieve his second victory of the season.

The hard-throwing Temple helped his own cause by knocking in two runs on a double and a single. Temple's battery-mate, Jim Hanson, third baseman, Bob Utley, and reserve, Kirr Nathan, also produced singles to aid the Falcons cause.

Farmington takes on the Berkley Bears tomorrow afternoon, May 3, at 4:00 p.m. They also tangled with the Bears in a postponed game Wednesday and played Van Dyke last Tuesday.

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### Trojans Post Track Victory

On Wednesday, April 30, Clarencville's track team played host in a triangular meet, against Brighton, Northville, and Clarencville. C.H.S. won the meet with 58 points. The other participating schools had 47 and 33 points respectively.

Clarencville took four first places: Ken Sitarz in the 100 and 220 yard dashes; George Barnum in the 120 yard low hurdles and half mile; Dan Mitchell and Fred Campbell tied for first places in the pole vault and high jump.

A quad-meet between Clarencville, Milford, Clarkston and South Lyons was held Friday, May 2, at Milford. The Trojan runners came in third with a score of 19 2/3 points. Milford won with 38 points, Clarkston came next with 23, and South Lyons was in last place, having 17 3/5 points.

First places for Clarencville were taken by Ken Sitarz in the 220 yard dash and Don Mitchell in the pole vault.

### FHS Shows Well In College Relay

Falcon thinclads, along with 2,709 other trackmen from 173 schools throughout Michigan, attended the Central Michigan College Relay at Mt. Pleasant, Saturday, May 3.

Rex Crawley went through the normal routine of setting another record by running the 120 yard high hurdles in a time of 14.5 seconds in the qualifying meet.

In the finals, Crawley came in first in the 180 yard low hurdles, and second in the 120 yard high hurdles. These gave Farmington their nine point total for the meet.

The trackmen who participated in the qualifying meets, but did not qualify: Mike Agee, 100 yard dash; Dewey Nichols and Dave Catherman, broad jump; and Mike Agee, Tom Grimshaw, Dave Catherman and Rex Crawley, 660 yard relay (they won their heat, but did not qualify).

Farmington also participated in the 440 yard relay, the shuttle hurdle relay and the 880 yard relay, but did not place in any of them.

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
