Each of the captives followed the orders of their masters, and wore such outfits as baseball uniforms, track suits, and Explorers uniforms (with comb boots), etc. They were forced to carry belongings, bow, carry luncheon trays after buying the lunches of their own, sing, read poetry, and dance as part of their activities for the day. 54 Will Go on Senior Trip Fifty-four members of Clarenceville's Senior Class will embark for Washington, D.C., Tuesday, May 27, from Plymouth. The students will board the train at Plymouth at 6:50 p.m. "First stop of the trip will be at Charlottesville, Virginia. Guided tours will be taken through Monticello Mansion, Thomas Jefferson's home, the University of Virginia, Shenandoah National Park and the Skyline Drive. From Charlottesville the students will travel via bus to Washington, D.C., arriving at 9:00 p.m. Early the next morning they will take an all-day tour of Washington. Included in the excursion will be such scenic spots as Washington Monument, Lincoln Memorial, Arlington Cemetery, Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, Robert E. Lee's Mansion, Joe Jima Marine Corps Memorial, and Mount Vernon. The evening activities will feature a moonlight cruise up the Potomac River. Tours of the public buildings will be held Friday morning: The Capitol Building, Bureau of Printing and Engraving, National Archives Building, White House, and Pan-American Building will all be visited. The final day in Washington will include a tour of the Smithsonian Institute. The students will leave Washington Friday afternoon for the return trip. Wood Creek Farms Pass Ordinance, Discuss Another One new ordinance was adopted and another proposed ordinance discussed by the Wood Creek Village Council at its regular meeting Tuesday night. The new ordinance, to be known as the Subdivision Procedures Ordinance, sets up regulations for the making and approving of plats and outlines the fees and other charges connected therewith. With minor changes, it is the same as the Farmington Township Plat Ordinance. Acting on the recommendation of Road Administrator Don Wells, the council also agreed to take into consideration the adoption of a village motor vehicle ordinance. Councilmen H. Dobson and Dr. Zar Reader were appointed to work with Wells in preparing a proposed ordinance for consideration at the next regular council meeting. Wells pointed out that he felt such an ordinance was necessary to better control through truck and car traffic in the village and truck weight loads. It was also pointed out that several residents in Holly Hills Subdivision to the west were using Wellington Road as a through route to Northwestern Highway and suggested that stop-signs be erected at Millbrook and other cross-roads to discourage this or, at least slow traffic down.
