Women to Attend State Co-Op Nursery Meeting

"You, Your Child, Your Nursery" will be the theme of the seventh annual Conference of the Michigan Council of Co-operative Nursery Groups at Michigan State University May 12-13. About 250 mothers and teachers representing more than 100 co-operative nursery groups in Michigan will visit Kollaga Center to hear current research and trends in child development.

Keynote speaker for the event will be Dr. Ernest Osborne, professor of education at Teachers' College, Columbia University. Dr. Osborne will discuss the provocative subject, "Parents Are Also People," at the luncheon session Tuesday, May 13. Workshop topics include creative activities, community work of preschool children and a special seminar for experienced mothers. Participants will also visit the Spartan Nursery on the University campus and view displays of mental health publications and materials for new nurseries.

The Michigan Council of Co-operative Nurseries, a unit of the M.S.U. department of home management and child development will co-sponsor this continuing education activity.

At the meeting held at the International Institute, Detroit, members and professional staff of the Society heard the annual report, "In Answer to Your Inquiry," the form of a dramatization of the services of the Society. One of the most important of these services is the promotion of chest X-rays which are vital in the discovery of tuberculosis. TB is number one among infectious diseases and to combat it there must be early discovery and cure. Everyone should have a chest X-ray each year to be sure that they do not have TB. Health education in the schools and community groups is another way the Society helps prevent TB by informing people of its dangers.
