## Local Firm Plans Petoskey Plant

Announcement was made last week that the McLaughlin Company of Farmington had entered into a preliminary agreement for the erection of a plant in Petoskey, Michigan, in which to make weld nuts, patented fasteners and clips for the auto industry.

A \$111,000 plant is proposed. The transaction hinges on whether school district voters agree Monday to sell a football practice field to the non-profit Petoskey Development Corp. as a site for the plant. It was indicated that McLaughlin would put up \$25,000 and the Development Corp. \$86,000 for the purchase of the field and building of the plant. Under terms of the preliminary agreement, McLaughlin would repay the \$86,000 through rental on a 15-year lease.

Officials said McLaughlin plans to employ about 35 workers at the plant to start. It was also indicated that operations at the McLaughlin plant here in Farmington would be continued.
