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

**Summer Driver Education Classes Scheduled; Plan Expansion in Fall**

This summer, students under 18 who wish to learn how to drive may take drivers' training during two of our regularly scheduled sessions.

The first session begins June 16 and ends July 21 with no classes on July 1 and the second is from July 22 to August 22. Anyone taking the course must be a resident of the Farmington school district.

The periods are held hourly from 8:11-10 a.m. Lunch is one half hour in length beginning at 11:15.

Following lunch, a lecture will be held until 1:00 p.m. The regular hourly period will then resume from 1:05 to 3:10 p.m.

Every student (there will be 80 in all—45 from F.H.S. and 35 from parochial schools) will drive either in the morning or the afternoon, depending on which period he has. The student will also be required to attend a lecture every other day.

Students for the course will have a choice as to which session they wish to attend, with the oldest students receiving top priority.

But, before a student is even considered for the summer course, he must have a form, explaining what the course is and the requirements for it, signed by his parent. This form can be obtained in the school office from Mrs. Gereau Monday, May 18, and must be returned by Friday, May 22.

Mr. Geiger, principal, said, "Because of the expense of the program, all students taking the course must be absolutely certain that they can attend all sessions, except in cases of illness." He went on to say, "Any students who drop the program after the first day will not be permitted to schedule the following school year, unless there is a legitimate reason for dropping it."

Mr. Clayton Graham and Mr. Clifford Broderson will be the instructors for the summer program.

As for drivers' education in the fall, the program will be stretched across an entire year instead of a semester. This will enable a teacher to accept six more students per period.

In this school program, the student will receive a lecture once a week and drive once every seven class days. The remainder of the time will be spent in his own study hall.

Mr. Geiger said that the reason for this doubling up on time is to use our facilities as efficiently as possible in order to take as many students as possible.

Even so, about 100 students will still be unable to take drivers' training this fall.

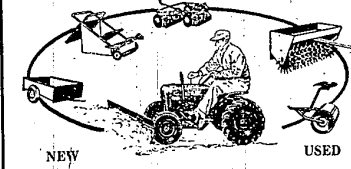
**Journalist to Take Trip to Ann Arbor**
