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April Report Police Handle 505 Complaints

Members of the Farmington Township Police Department traveled a total of 6,342 miles during the month of April on patrol and in answering complaints throughout the area.

A total of 505 complaints were handled during the month. The biggest single activity of the department was that of conducting investigations of 13 malicious destruction of property cases. Officers also handled 15 larceny cases and conducted investigations on six break-ins.

A total of 17 auto accidents were handled during the month. Two resulted in personal injuries and one proved fatal.

Reports of dog bites were on the increase with the warmer weather; 16 cases were handled. The department also received two stolen bikes, and one stolen car.

Other activities included the issuing of 11 summons.

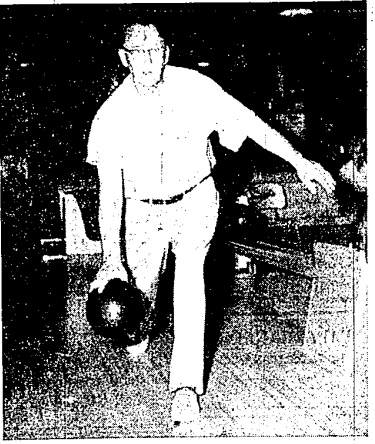
Falcon Golf Team Will Finish in Third

Bowls 300 Game at Farmington Lanes

A change in alleys apparently proved a lucky move for William Van Norstrand of Farmington Trailer Court Bowling in the final round of bowling in the Farmington Trailer Court Mixed League last Friday night, he rolled 13 straight strikes for a perfect 300 game.

The league, which has been bowling all season at Redford Recreation, had to make a last shift in plans with flooding conditions there forced the temporary shutdown of the alleys. The League, therefore, made arrangements to hold its last match of the season at Farmington Lanes.

A 154 average bowler for the season - the first he has bowled in league competition since 1944 - Van Norstrand really found the strange Farmington Lane alleys to his liking. According to the proprietors at Farmington Lanes this is the first perfect game to have been bowled there in over ten years.

Falcons Split With Berkley, Tied for First in League

Farmington's varsity baseball team remained in a tie with Berkley for first place in the Inter-Lakes League by splitting two games with the Berkley team. Going into the two-game series, both teams were undefeated.

After defeating the Falcons in the first game, 5-2, the Bears scored a 1-0 defeat at the hands of the Falcons last Friday.

In the first game the Bears took the lead in the third inning and added two more runs before the Falcons could tally. The Bears scored their final two runs in the sixth.

Franz Nourbrecht was the winning pitcher and Roy Temple the loser. The Bears were unable to cope with the pitching of Farmington's Chuck Thompson in the second game. Although Thompson held Berkley scoreless and yielded only one hit, he didn't get any offensive support from his teammates until the sixth inning when the Falcons scored the only run of the game. Catcher Jim Hanson doubled and advanced to third on a single by Ross Byron. Hanson then scored on a single by Joe Hamilton.

Farmington and Berkley are now tied for first place in the Inter-Lakes League, each team having won five and lost one game.

The Falcons played against Waterloo here Tuesday night. Their next games will be at Southfield tomorrow afternoon and at home against Walled Lake on Tuesday.

F.H.S. Will Host League Track Meet May 21

Farmington will play host to the Twelfth Annual Inter-Lakes Conference Track Meet next Wednesday afternoon May 21.

This is the first time that the annual meet will be held on the new Farmington track. All of the schools in the Inter-Lakes Conference will compete for the awards. The field events will begin at 1:30 p.m. with preliminaries in the 120 yard high hurdles. Preliminaries in the 100 yard dash, 180 yard hurdles, and 220 yard dash will be completed by 4:00 p.m., when the final events will be run. Beginning at 4:00 p.m., the order of events is: 120 yard high hurdles, medley relay, 100 yard dash, one mile run, 440 yard dash, 160 yard high hurdles, 220 yard dash, 880 yard run, 440 yard relay, and 880 yard relay.

Each of the six Inter-Lakes schools will be entered in all events. Each school is permitted three entries in each event except the 440 yard relay. Only four entries per school are allowed in that event.

A trophy will be awarded to the team winning the meet. First place winners in each event will receive a medal. Second, third, fourth, and fifth place winners will receive ribbons.

Student tickets will be sold in advance of the meet for 35 cents. No student tickets will be sold at the meet. Adult tickets may be purchased for 50 cents.

In reviewing Friday's contest, Coach Larry Natter of Clarenceville remarked, "It should have been our game. We had a man on second and third with one away in the bottom of the seventh."

Falcon Thinclads Take 9 Firsts

Farmington took nine first places to Berkley's four in a track meet held here during a stop-and-go downpour Thursday, May 8, at 4:00 p.m.

Among those nine first places, Rex Cawley, vice-president in charge of setting track records, set another one, this time in the 440 yard relay in a time of 32.9 seconds. Following Cawley were Mike Agee, second, in 32.3 seconds; and Ron Rader, third, in 35.9 seconds.

Cawley also earned his usual first place in the high jump with a 5'8" jump. Earlier this year he set the record at 5'10".

Also showing remarkable speed and ability was Tom Grisham, who came in first in the 100 yard dash and 180 yard high hurdles in 10.9 and 21.6 seconds, respectively.

Dave Catherman placed first in the 220 yard dash in 24.2 seconds and second in the 100 yard dash in 11 seconds.

In the 120 yard dash, Farmington placed first and third with Peckham running in 17.4, and Frank Clappison in 19.3 seconds, respectively.

Mike Agee and Dewey Nichols monopolized the broad jump for first and second places. Agee jumped 19'11", and Nichols, 19'10".

Ed Fulton ran in first place in the 880 yard run in two minutes and 16 seconds.

U.M. Professor To Speak May 20

Guest speaker for the Farmington Junior - Senior High PTA meeting to be held Tuesday, May 20, at 8 p.m. will be W. Robert Dixon, Professor of Education at the University of Michigan. The meeting will be held at the Farmington Senior High Cafeteria.

Dr. Dixon was educated at Syracuse University and the University of Michigan, earning the Ph.D. degree at Michigan in 1948. After receiving the Master's degree from Syracuse University in 1939, he was a teacher of history and later high school principal in the Middleville (New York) school system.

He enrolled at the University of Michigan for graduate study after the war, being employed part-time as a research assistant in the Community Adult Education Program.

In 1948 - 49, Dr. Dixon was on the faculty of the University of Illinois, returning to Michigan as assistant professor of education in the fall of 1949.

Professor Dixon is a member of the American Psychological Association, National Association of College Teachers of Education, Phi Kappa Phi, and Phi Delta Kappa.

In 1940 Dr. Dixon married the former Carol E. Dixon of Syracuse, New York. They have two children, William R. and Barbara.

April Report Building Down Slightly From '57

Building activities in Farmington edged up somewhat during the month of April but are still slightly below a year ago report issued by the city and township building departments disclosed.

A total of 34 permits were issued for the construction of new single-family dwellings in the township having an estimated valuation of \$778,150. This is nine less than the number issued in April of 1957. A total of 43 permits were issued in April last year having a valuation of \$883,400.

Last month the township building department also issued 14 permits for additions to existing homes at a total valuation of \$17,200, two permits for additions to other buildings at a value of \$4,000 and 7 permits for residential garages, valued at \$6,250.

In addition, five permits were given for the construction of swimming pools at a total value of \$30,900.

In the city, five new home permits were issued in April having a total valuation of \$101,000. This is one less than a year ago with a \$9,000 lesser total valuation.

Four permits were issued for additions to homes at a valuation of \$7,400 and eight for garages valued at \$8,797. One permit for erection of a swimming pool valued at \$2,000 was also given out.
