Levis, Jeans Out Next Year

Beginning September 1, 1958, students of Clarenceville High will not be allowed to wear levis, jeans or overalls to school. The action was taken by the Board of Education upon recommendation of the Student Council of Clarenceville.

The following is a letter from the Clarenceville Student Council:

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE STUDENT BODY OF CLARENCEVILLE HIGH FROM THE CLARENCEVILLE STUDENT COUNCIL.

May 9, 1958

Action has been taken by the Board of Education on the subject of levis. Beginning with September of the next school year, all types of levis, blue jeans and overalls will be banned for school wear.

We, the Clarenceville Student Council, sent a recommendation to the Board of Education on this problem. We advocated the banning of levis possibly by the end of March, because we felt that the few who wear them lowered the appearance of our student body. We still feel that we were acting for the good of the entire school, despite much adverse criticism.

The Board considered our recommendation favorably, but because of the present recession affecting our school district, it was felt by the Board, that it would be unwise to act on this action immediately. Consequently the Board set the date for banning of levis on September 1, 1958.

We hope that all concerned will realize that this action will prove the appearance of our students and bolster the reputation of Clarenceville.
