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North Congregational Carillon Concert Planned Sunday

On Sunday, May 25th, Dr. Chester B. Emerson will be guest preacher at the morning dedication service of the Tower Carillon at 11:00 a.m. at North Congregational Church, Northwestern Highway and Lahser Road, Tuesday, May 27th, at 12:30 p.m.

The Carillon is the gift of Dr. Emerson, who for many years, 1914 to 1932, was minister of North Congregational Church at Woodward and Blaine streets in the Westwood area.

The Carillon, costing \$7000, is an electronic Maas-Rowe creation, with the keyboard attached next to the organ console so that it may be played by the organist. There is also an automatic record player, with a clock mechanism to regulate the playing of the Carillon.

At 12:15 p.m., following the dedication service, there will be a Carillon recital by Frederick L. Marriott, at present organist at the Central Methodist Church.

He was appointed official carillonneur for the Catholic Congress of 1936 in Belgium and for twenty years was carillonneur and organist at the University of Chicago.

Marriott is one of our country's top rank organists and has played recitals in most every state in the Union as well as in Canada and Europe.

The Sunday's program will include "Prelude for Carillon" by Van den Gheyn; "Ave Maria" by Denys; "Alleluia, Lord God" by Palestrina; "Prelude for Carillon" by Marriott and several hymn tunes.

Christ Jesus' healing of Simon's wife's mother who "was taken with a great fever" (Luke 4) will be among the selections read from the King James Version of the Bible.

Correlative selections from Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures by Mary Baker Eddy will also be read.
