

Announces Candidacy as GOP 4th District State Representative

Ralph S. Moore, Jr., of Berkley has announced that he will run on the Republican ticket as a candidate for the 4th District Representative seat of the Michigan Legislature. The 4th District consists of Farmington, Berkley, Oak Park, the new city of Southfield, Novi, Lyon and the villages and villages located within those townships.

Moore is a practicing attorney of seven years' standing, a member of the American Judicature Society and the Michigan State Bar Committee on Medical-Legal Problems. He was also an assistant prosecuting attorney for Oakland County for a period.

Moore has long been active in Republican circles. He was instrumental in forming the North Woodward Republican Club and was its first president. He has acted as a delegate in both county and state Republican conventions and acted as Republican chairman for the City of Berkley. He has sought political office only one other time when he ran for Municipal Judge in the City of Berkley as second in a field.

Moore is a veteran of World War II. He attended the University of Michigan and Detroit College of Law, and graduated from the latter college with the degree of LL.B.

He is married and has two children.

Moore stated "The federal and state governments are becoming too large and all-encompassing. If the present trend continues we will be in jeopardy of losing our personal freedoms."

He believes that the power being concentrated in the state government is depriving local communities and governments of the freedom of action that has been traditionally theirs. He decries any system whereby the state becomes the sole levier and collector of taxes and funnels only that portion of proceeds back to the local communities that it sees fit.

Moore believes that the State of Michigan will be prosperous only if the present trend of taxing industry and business "all the traffic will bear" is halted, and a more

Timely Tips on GARDENING

BLOSSOM DISPLAY— Farmington landscape has become a rainbow of color as more and more trees and shrubs have come into bloom. The flowering Crabs, with their white and pink blossoms, have dominated the show in many gardens, and where tulips have been planted nearby the results are spectacular. Dogwoods, with their showy flower-like bracts, and azaleas are a blaze of color. Lilacs, the most popular of all shrubs, are now in bloom, filling the air with their sweet scent. Hostas, Pines, and Spruce grow into large trees. They are useful in background plantings and as lawn specimens. The Black Hills Spruce has a beautiful form and grows rapidly. Most pines soon grow large and become bare looking at the base. An exception is the Scotch pine, a low growing type that is suitable for foundation planting.

An interesting blend of shades and textures as well as form can be obtained by planting several varieties of evergreens. However, too much variety can result in landscaping that does not have a unified look. Be sure to check on the ultimate size of the plants. Leave enough space between plants and place them far enough from the house so they will not be a nuisance to transplant. Evergreens with the roots in a ball of earth that is wrapped in burlap.

REMEMBERS— Prune evergreens to encourage dense growth. Order insecticides weekly. Remove blossoms from newly planted shrubs. Begin to plant tender vegetable and flower seeds. Begin to set out vegetable and flower plants. Freeze the first year and once every year thereafter. Water new trees and shrubs thoroughly every week. Keep wilted blooms picked from Panicles to prolong bloom.

DOG BITE CASES ON INCREASE; Report Promptly

Dog bite cases reported in the township are on the increase as a result of the warmer weather. Prompt reporting is essential. It is not that the dogs or any other animals are more vicious or infectious with the changing seasonal weather, but the weather comes. When warmer weather comes, however, the winter protective clothing is discarded for lighter wear and more skin is exposed to bites. Rabies suspected animals are kept under close observation for ten days. The County Dog Warden enforces the state law in unincorporated areas. Only positive diagnosis of Rabies is by laboratory procedures. If the quarantined animal, within ten days subsequent to the bite dies, the owner is liable for the cost of the animal. All animals should be reported to local police stations. These living areas in which the County Dog Warden enforces the state law can also call FE 8-9621.
