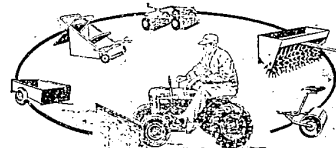

**Will be Shooting for Two State Records**

Stellar Farmington High thinned Warren (Rex) Crawley will be out to set two new state track records this Saturday when he competes with top runners from throughout Michigan at the State Class A Track Meet in Ann Arbor Saturday.

In competition last Saturday in the Class A Regional Meet at Eastern Michigan in Ypsilanti Crawley set unofficial state records in the 100 yard hurdles event and equalled the state mark in the high hurdles. He ran the low hurdles in 19.1 seconds to cut half a second off the record mark established by Dave Hayes in this event. He equalled the state mark in the high hurdles in a time of 14.4 seconds. Two other Falcon thinned qualified to compete in the state meet Saturday as did the 880 yard relay team.

Miler Jim Marsh placed second in the regionals last Saturday in the 1000 yard race in a time of 4:38. Placing third in both the broad jump and pole vault events to qualify for the state meet were Dewey Nichols.

The Farmington 880 relay team, consisting of Mike Agee, Tom Grimshaw, Dave Catherman and Crawley (anchor man) placed third behind Pontiac and Inkster. They ran the event in a time of 1:33.6.

As an overall team, Farmington High placed third in the Regionals at Ypsilanti last Saturday with 23 1/2 points. Pontiac High placed first and Inkster second. Placing fourth behind Farmington was Walled Lake. Farmington's third place accomplishment in the regionals was considered exceptional in view of the fact that it was one of the smallest schools competing in the event.
