Will Attend International Sorority Convention in Colorado in June

Miss Jane Grinager, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Grinager of 2830 Halstead Road, Miss Nancy Gale of Lansing, and Miss Barbara Hoffa of Detroit are the official delegates from Beta Tau chapter of Albion College, Albion, attending the Zeta Tau Alpha International convention to be held in Colorado Springs, Colorado. Miss Grinager is president of Beta Tau chapter, and Miss Gale is vice-president.

Convention assignment of Beta Tau chapter will be to prepare a bulletin board for display showing themes used in rushing this year. Other highlights of the convention will be a memorial service for deceased members of the fraternity, a chuck wagon dinner, a pool-side breakfast, a Miss Province contest, a "Come to Quebec" luncheon, and an Awards Banquet. Sunday will be the traditional "White Day" when all delegates will dress in white the entire day. All ritualistic services will be held at this time.

The ZTA Colorado convalesce will be the 24th national and 13th international convention held since the fraternity's founding in Virginia in 1892. These convalesces are held every two years.

Since 1917, the Zeta philanthropic program has centered around the treatment and training of cerebral palsied children. In cooperation with the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults, Inc., the Eastern Seal Society, ZTA has issued a set of film strips and slides called "A Child's Road to Independence" for special use by parents and teachers of the cerebral palsied.

These are being distributed widely and are a part of many audio-visual programs. Previously, Zetas worked again with the Eastern Seal group in the publishing of an equipment manual for cerebral palsy therapy. Costing thousands of dollars, this Manual has received high acclaim from both professional and lay people and has had wide distribution in this country and been sent to 41 foreign countries. At the 1936 convention in New Jersey, the Zeta Tau Alpha Foundation was established for the purpose of awarding scholarships to college students training for work with cerebral palsied children.

Garlic Bread

Try Blue cheese garlic bread for a treat the next time you serve spaghetti. To make it, mix equal parts of Blue cheese and butter - about 1 cup of each. Leaving Today for Summer-Long Tour of European Countries

Accompanying her is a friend from Parke-Davis, Miss Jean Fixer. They plan to sail on the "Carinthia" to Gdansk, Scotland. They will tour the Scottish Highlands, visit Glasgow and Edinburgh, then South to the Lowlands and Newcastle, England. There they will board the Bergen Steamer for Norway, attend the "Bergen Festival" and tour the fjords and mountain country. The girls will go on to Stockholm, Sweden to Göteborg and Copenhagen. From Denmark Sally and Jean will go to Holland and into Germany where they will follow the Rhine River from Dusseldorf to Frankfurt, through the black forest and south to Zurich, Switzerland.

Here Sally will pick up her new Volkswagen. They plan to tour Switzerland, go north to Munich, Germany and on to Vienna, Austria. From Austria they will tour Italy, visiting Venice, Naples and Rome. They will motor along the shores of the Mediterranean Sea to Gibraltar where they will cross into Tangier, North Africa.

Returning to Spain, they will travel north to Madrid and Lisbon. They plan to continue northward across the Pyrenees Mountains into France. In France they will go through the Bordeaux country and on to Paris. From Paris to Brussels, Belgium and the World's Fair, across the channel back to England to visit points of interest there, in Wales and in Ireland. They will return by plane from Shannon, Ireland, September 15.

The AAA is helping to plan the trip and the U.S. Counsel will inquire as to the Foreign countries.
