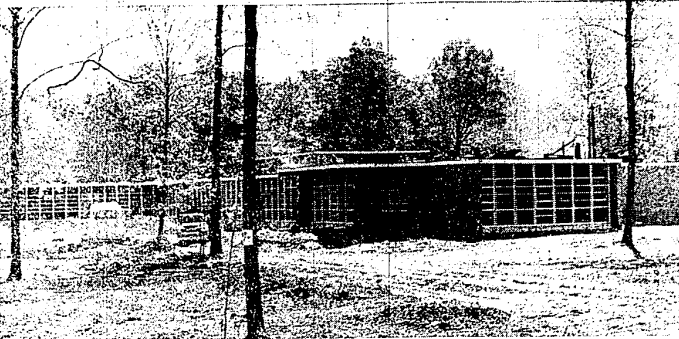

Will Build Plant In Petoskey The way was cleared last week in Petoskey, Michigan, for erection of a plant there by the McLaughlin Company of Farmington when voters voiced almost unanimous approval for sale of old football practice field on which it was proposed to build the plant. Weld nuts, patented fasteners and clips for the auto industry were made in the new plant there. About 35 workers will be employed at the plant to start. The non-profit Petoskey Improvement Corp. is putting up \$86,000 for purchase of the land and erection of the building with another \$23,000 being put up by the McLaughlin Co. Under terms of the preliminary agreement, McLaughlin will repay the \$86,000 through rental on a 15-year lease. Operations at the local McLaughlin plant will not be affected, it was emphasized.
