

Take Part in Big Civil Air Patrol Practice Rescue Mission Recently

New Hudson Airport was the scene of a practice rescue mission on a recent weekend for the Civil Air Patrol, Wing 63, Group 11.

Camp was set up the evening of May 17 by an advance detail to enable the seniors and cadets arriving Saturday morning to sign in and be assigned to duties immediately. Among the 110 who arrived Saturday morning were top officers, members of the group staff.

The cadets were assigned to various duties during the morning.

In the afternoon two officers, Captain Dickerson and Captain Stedley, accompanied by two cadets set out a panel to represent a crashed airplane in the vicinity of New Hudson.

Planes with cadet observers were sent up to locate the panel. Word finally came over the radio at about 3:15 that the panel had been found. The ambulance and a radio car advanced to the scene. Assisted by an airplane circling the position, the ambulance arrived in time to admit the cadets and return them to camp to eat.

In the evening, movies of Group 11's drill team were shown to the cadets. After the movies the cadets formed a circle and sang.

Sunday morning church services were held for all demonstrators, even though it was pouring rain.

Group Drill Competition was held in the early afternoon with Captain Gelb, Captain Dickerson and Captain Stedley as judges.

Prof. Says All Youths Gifted

"I hold the view that ALL youth are gifted in some way," declares Ralph C. Wenrich, chairman of the department of vocational education and practical arts at the University of Michigan.

"There is much concern these days about the education of the youth in a democratic society. It is the responsibility of the schools to provide a variety of learning experiences in which each youth can discover and nurture," Professor Wenrich maintains.

"To be sure, not all are endowed with a high degree of intellectual powers. The talents of some may be found in artistic, mechanical, or musical fields. Others may be gifted in their ability to deal with people."

Professor Wenrich feels that in view of the anticipated manpower needs in the U.S., it becomes increasingly important that we make better use of our human resources.

"This suggests the need for helping youth to discover and identify their interests and aptitudes and then to provide them with the opportunity to develop whatever talents they possess to the limits of their capacities," he says.



IF A TORNADO or any other type of disaster alert should be sounded, children in the Farmington schools have been well trained to move in an orderly and rapid fashion to the most protective pre-designated parts of the building they are located in prior to the time the low strikes. This was the unanimous opinion expressed by Civil Defense officials following a visit to several schools in the district last Wednesday to observe the staging of practice alerts in the buildings. Youngsters at the Eagle School are shown in the positions they would assume to a "strike."

Officials also agreed that an area hit by disaster could be readily blocked off by trained Civil Defense workers so that rescue, medical treatment and clean-up operations could be conducted following a "strike." The square mile between 12 and 13 Mile from Orchard Lake Road to Farmington Road was effectively blocked off by auxiliary CP policemen for one hour during the alert last Wednesday.
