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Timely Tips on GARDENING

SPRING'S PROGRESS — The tender green of Spring foliage has imperceptibly changed to the rich deep tones of summer. Only the evergreens still have a pastel green and soon this new growth will "harden off" and turn a darker shade.

Flowers are fading on the lilies and only a few tulips remain but other trees and shrubs are continuing the blossom display. Ancest are still a blaze of color. Pauls Scarlet Hawthorn trees are covered with small bright rose-pink flowers, and in some Farmington gardens (Tamerix) have become feathery pink clouds. Gnarled old vines of Wisteria, often climbing to rooftops, are festooned with lovely lavender clusters. Laburnum, or Golden-chains, are blossoming now, too. The flowers on these colorful trees look like yellow Wisteria blossoms.

Iris are turning flower beds into a rainbow of color, and Oriental Peonies and their tree-like blossoms to the picture.

Iris — Iris are regarded by many as the Queen of the flowers. This is especially true for the tall "bearded" iris. The flowers, which are raised above the clump of sword-like foliage in sturdy three-foot stems, are formed. There are a few other flowers available in such an assortment of colors.

The remarkable variety and richness in color is the result of systematic work by American and European hybridizers. The varieties introduced in recent years are sturdy and their colors are richer and clearer.

Each year the American Iris Society awards the "Dykes Medal" to one variety. This award, named for one of the early Iris hybridizers, signifies the variety that the American Iris Society considers most outstanding. The 1957 winner was "Violet Harmony" and the runner-up was Iris named "Happy Birthday". Among the varieties that have won the award in past years are "Red Douglas", deep red-purple; "Great Lakes", light blue; "Missouri", deep blue; "Front Sunset", a true sunset blend.

The American Iris Society has also conducted a popularity poll and published a list of 100 favorites. Among the list is "Truly Ours", a yellow blend that won the Dykes award two years ago. Next comes "Happy Birthday", then "Mary Tandall", a mossy, orchid-pink, "Palomino", seash-pink, and "Blue Sapphire", sharp, bold accents.

REMEMINDERS — Continue to set out vegetable and flower plants. Begin planting beans. Begin insect control. Spray pines with DDT or Malathion to control pine-needle scale. Continue weekly watering of newly planted trees and shrubs. Pinch tips of Mums to encourage bushiness. Stake heavy heads of Iris to prevent wind damage.

Sub League in Study of Gov't

A complete study of types of government and possible combinations to suit Farmington Township as a whole is being planned by the Township League of Subdivision Associations, according to Robert H. Nelson, president.

The League board of directors met Monday night, and will meet again on plans to divide up the study of local government among the various committees.

Such committees members may not hold paid or elected public office, and must reside in one of the subdivisions belonging to the League.

The League plans to make several reports, and to make a mass mailing to the membership in the near future. Several of the subdivision associations have not yet renewed memberships and would not be eligible for such mailings.

MR. NELSON reports the next quarterly meeting of the assembly of delegates will take place at the Farmington Savings building. He plans to recommend to the board that it include on the agenda a study of the League's rules on stands it can properly take on public property. He hopes for a more energetic opinion, and rules on how the policies may be carried out.
