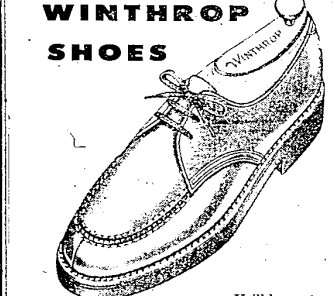

Track, Baseball Trophies, Other Special Awards Given at All-Sports Banquet

A number of special awards were presented to Farmington high athletes at the All-Sports Banquet held last week at Galt's Frontier Town. A capacity crowd of fathers and sons as well as numerous other interested persons were in attendance.

Trophies were presented to both the baseball and track teams as champions in the Inter-Lakes Conference this year. Paul Williams, announcer and sportscaster for WWJ, emceed the program.

Entertainment included a fencing exhibition by Byron Krier, an Olympic representative from the United States, and Bill Goering, Connecticut State Fencing Champion.

The Farmington also placed sixth in the State Class A meet. Special medals were presented to Cawley as winner of both the high and low hurdle events, competing against the best runners.

David Holmes, retiring coach at Wayne State University, who spoke at the banquet, had high praise for Cawley. He stated that he was one of the best hurdlers that he has seen in his 30 years of coaching experience.

The basketball team which concluded the season with a record of eight wins and two losses, was honored as co-title holders in the Inter-Lakes League with Berkeley. Stungled out for special recognition were Bob Utley, batting champion, and Al LeSage, Sophomore hurler Chuck Thompson was also commended for his brilliant pitching during the season.

Another highlight of the evening was the annual presentation of the Aschenbrenner and Brykalski-Coolman awards to the outstanding junior and senior boys in athletics.

The Aschenbrenner Award was presented to Jim Marsh and the Brykalski-Coolman Award to Al LeSage. The Aschenbrenner Award winner is selected from the senior class by the athletic committee, from nominations chosen by the coaching staff. Candidates are selected on the basis of number of sports participating, number of sports participation, special recognition received, sportsmanship and school citizenship. A memorial object of art, award established by the 1917 Class of F.H.S. for two men who lost their lives in W.W. II, and the Brykalski-Coolman Award winner is selected from the Junior and Senior classes by the faculty. Several other popular football jockeys will spin records for the young people's dance alternating with music by a Dixieland Band.

Dancing on Saturday evening will be to the music of Dave Farley's orchestra in the form of a Cabaret Band Dance. Many stars of radio and television, and several members of the Detroit Lions football team will be present to meet fans.
