Summer Program at Northwest YWCA to Get Underway June 23

The Northwest YWCA last week announced its summer program of swimming and other activities for girls and women which will open the week of June 23rd and will continue for 2 four-week sessions.

The "Pony-Tailers Round Up" - a day camp program for girls 10 through 11 years will be held on the site of the new YWCA building at 2590 Grand River three mornings per week - Monday, Wednesday, and Friday - from 10:00 to 12:00 noon.

Activities in crafts, dramatics, games, and sports will be planned with special trips and events occurring on Friday. A char-

tered bus will take the group to various points of interest in and around Detroit. The only fee for this program is \$1.00 Junior Membership. Enrollment must be made at the Northwest Branch office, 17288 Redford Avenue, before the program starts.

Swimming classes will be offered twice a week - Tuesday and Thursday morning - at the Edison Pool in Greenfield Village, Southfield at Oakwood Blvd. Four classes of instruction are scheduled: Beginner (8-12 years) from 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m.; Intermediate (13-15 years) from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.; and Beginner (6-8 years) from 12:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m.
