Seek Nursery School Building

The Mayfair Co-operative Nursery is looking for a suitable building for its school program next year. Officials discussed Monday.

The group is composed of approximately forty families from this area who have joined together for the purpose of providing preschool education for their children. Operating under a license from the Michigan Department of Social Welfare and under the guidance of a trained teacher, they are completing their third year of operation. The school is presently located at the Trinity Episcopal Church.

Mayfair Nursery is one of almost 100 non-profit co-operative nurseries now in operation throughout the state of Michigan. The requirements for facilities are set by the Michigan Department of Health, for Day Care Centers. The group has classes of children meeting twice a week on a schedule coinciding with the Farmington Public Schools.
