A Regular Meeting of the Farmington Township Board was called to order on June 10th, 1958, at 8:10 P.M. by Mr. Cairns, Township Clerk.

Motion by Brown, supported by Fisher, nominating Mr. Cairns as Chairman Pro Tem in Mr. Stephenson's absence. Carried. (Also acting as Clerk.)

3. Belmont Drive from its Western intersection with Staman Circle Drive to its Eastern intersection with Staman Circle Drive.

5. Staman Court from its Northern intersection with Staman Circle Drive to its Southern intersection with Staman Circle Drive.

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CAP Prepares For Summer Encampment

Each summer Civil Air Patrol cadets from the Michigan Wing are given the opportunity to spend two weeks at an Air Force Base.

This summer the Farmington Squadron will be represented at the Chanute Air Force Base, Illinois, from July 19 until August 1. A carefully planned and supervised program of activities furnishes practical experience in many phases of aviation and the services of chaplains of all three major faiths are available throughout the encampment. Social activities aren't overlooked either.

The encampment usually ends with a dance. Transportation to and from the encampment is normally provided in Air Force aircraft.

Eligibility is obtained after receiving parental consent and completing the application. The first two achievements are:

1. Achievement one consists of passing the test on "Aviation and You," building a model airplane and passing a written test.

2. Achievement two is the passing of "Aircraft in Flight," a classification of ten aircraft, verbal explanation of the plane's essential parts and attendance at 16 meetings.

Sister M. Consolata, a sister of charity of Augustine, Cleveland, a cousin of Father Walker, was present. Father Hugh Dillan, a Trappist Father not present, is another relative in religion.

Father Walker has been assigned to St. Mary's of Redford parish in Detroit.

He was born in Montreal, Canada, July 27, 1910, the son of John W. and Mary C. (Parks) Shaw and was united in marriage to Ora C. McDowell April 10, 1930. They had resided in Farmington for 10 years.

He was a member of the Chrysler Corporation.

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Takes Adventist Army Training

Charles L. Allen, 21326 Whitlock, Farmington, was among 250 students sent through the United States and Puerto Rico who have been learning to save lives rather than destroy them. He attended the annual national training camp sponsored by the Seventh-day Adventist Church at Grand Ledge, Michigan.

Attending at their own expense, these men, classified as "conscientious objectors," were at the camp until June 17 to take a stiff training course to prepare them for medical work.

Days began early for the trainees with first call sounding at 5:30 a.m. followed by a tightly packed schedule of tests until taps at 9:30 p.m. Training for the medical corps included standard army and Red Cross first aid courses.

Training guard duty, military aspects of atomic energy and chemical warfare, courses in anatomy and physiology, emergency medical treatment, first aid, records, military sanitation and disease prevention, the organization and function of medical units, and the transportation of the sick and wounded.

Also included in the training were courses on the achievement and traditions of the army, drill and ceremonies, intelligence gathering, military courtesy and customs, military justice, organization of the army, physical education and character.

The camp has the formal approval of the army surgeon general's office and a highlight of the closing week's events will be a visit by Col. Byron Steger, army surgeon.
