**Timely Tips on GARDENING**

**CHERRY TIME**

Gardens are now experiencing an early summer lull. The flowers of Spring are a pleasant memory, and the annuals planted a few weeks ago are not yet producing their colorful display. However, some perennial borders are bright with color. Tall blue spikes of delphinium contrast with the white, blue, and gold of lilies, and chrysanthemums are beginning to bloom.

Cherry trees are "stealing the show" for a second time. Now they are laden with fruit.

**REPLANTING IRIS**

July is the best time to plant iris. It is also the time to dig up and divide large clumps that have become so crowded that they are not blooming well. After three or four years many clumps of iris become hollow in the center because the older rhizomes are unproductive.

Using a spading fork, carefully lift out the clump. Brush off the dirt and cut the rhizomes apart. Discard the old, woody looking center rhizomes. Each piece of rhizome that has a fan of leaves growing from it will eventually produce a new plant. Most gardeners prefer to plant three rhizomes in a triangular arrangement so that they will get a sizeable display more quickly. The rhizomes grow in one direction, so place them with the growing end facing away from the center of the clump.

Dig a shallow hole and place the rhizomes on a sandy bed of soil with the finer roots extending out and deeper. Iris prefer to be only lightly covered with soil. In many cases, as they grow the rhizomes push above the ground level but this does no harm. After planting, cut the leaves back to four or five inches.

In addition to replanting old clumps, now is the time to plant new varieties. If notes were made of names when the iris were in bloom, the gardener will have no difficulty selecting and ordering his favorites.

**Over Half of Residents in Area Oppose Sunday Opening of Stores**

Well over half the residents of Farmington believe it is unethically or "wrong" for business to remain open on Sunday. But only about one-third favor laws to make Sunday shopping illegal.

This is the principal finding of the University of Michigan's Detroit Area Study (DAS) which interviewed a random sample of Wayne, Macomb, and Oakland county residents about their attitudes on Sunday shopping during February and March this year.

DAS Director Harry Sharp reports: "Strong opposition to Sunday store hours tends to increase with age. One-half of those Detroiters over 60 years old feel that it is never morally justifiable for stores to be open on Sunday. Only three out of every 10 adults between the ages of 21 and 39 agree with their older neighbors."

"Shopping on Sunday is a comparatively recent invention. It is possible that older residents, as compared with young adults, are more accustomed to finish their shopping on Saturday, and therefore experience little need for Sunday visits to the store."

In contrast to age, political preferences are not consistently related to attitudes toward Sunday business. Approximately equal proportions of Republicans and Democrats approve or disapprove of this practice. Business on Sunday, apparently, is not seen by Detroiters as an issue which is related to political considerations.

"The lower the socio-economic class, the greater the disapproval of business on Sunday. Less well educated and lower income Detroiters have considerably larger proportions against Sunday hours under any circumstances than is true for college trained persons or those with 1957 incomes in excess of \$10,000. Nonetheless, it should be pointed out that about one-third of even the lowest income and high income Detroiters classify business on Sunday as at least usually wrong."

Church membership is also associated with attitudes toward Sunday shopping. Only 13 percent of the adult church members in greater Detroit believe it is never wrong for stores to be open on Sunday. Twice as high a proportion of non-members believe it is.

**C'ville School Tax Rate Same**

A tax millage the same as last year was approved last week by the board of education for Clarencville Public Schools. The levy will be 28.95 mills on net equalized valuations, and will produce \$488,453.

The levy is the same in Farmington Township, City of Livonia, and Redford.

THE BOARD also heard presentations by two architectural firms, and will hear others as plans develop for the school additions. Robert Thompson, a professional architect and science instructor, presented a report on the science layouts for the new high school.

Teacher contracts were approved for Harold Frank, Jr., Senior High Special Education; Judith Gilbert, kindergarten; and John Bergstrom, High School science teacher.

THE DISTRICT plans to borrow \$200,000 in anticipation of receipt of 1958-59 state appropriations.

Super Louis E. Schmidt inquired and learned that state aid payments for the first six months of 1958-59 period will have to be paid entirely from sales tax collections, and the state will make no advances. It may be there will be only half payments made during August through December, so all schools will have finance problems the coming year.

AUTHORIZATION was given the administration to ask bids on furniture and other equipment for the two special education rooms which will be placed in the new building with Oakland County schools. One teacher for the Junior-Senior High group has been hired, and Clarencville is looking for a qualified teacher on the elementary level.

Dr. Malcolm Delaney was designated the school doctor to give physical examinations to bus drivers, and W. T. Anicka was authorized to employ someone for the district to perform bus and soil surveys.

The proposed 1958-59 budget was tabled until the July 10 board meeting.

**Give Furniture New Sparkle**

Has the varnished furniture in your home been dulled by exposure to smoke, dust and grease? If so, you can make it brighter again by a very simple process.

You start by cleaning the varnished surface first. To do this, mix one teaspoon gum turpentine and 3 tablespoons of boiled linseed oil that have been added to one cup of hot water. Wipe just on one section of the furniture at a time. When this mixture gets cool, mix another batch. Rub on with a fine cloth or use very fine steel wool if the surface has been neglected for a long time. Wipe the surface with a clean cloth, wring out of warm water, and follow by rubbing with a dry cloth.

Then you can restore the finish with a 3-oz. steel wool pad dipped in equal parts of raw linseed oil and gum turpentine. Apply very lightly and carefully especially on the edges, to prevent the steel wool from cutting. Wipe off with a dry cloth — the cloudiness should be gone.

Make sure you have boiled linseed oil for the cleaning and raw linseed oil for the rubbing. Be sure you have gum turpentine for both purposes.
