It was emphasized that all re-stered voters are qualified to vote even though they ay not be property owners in the district. Specifically, voters will be asked to authorize an ditional school operation tax levy of five mills (\$5 r \$1,000 of the assessed valuation as equalized) for period of five years to pay a part of the operating expenses the school district.
