Know Weeds For Best Control

Scientists at the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station point out that there are many chemicals that will kill weeds. But their use is specific. Certain chemicals have been developed to kill one or only a few species of weeds. Some are very selective; they will kill a certain weed growing in with other plants while not damaging the desired plants.

You can get help in identifying weeds from your county agricultural agent. Check with him first. If the weed can't be identified locally, send it to the Department of Botany and Plant Pathology, Michigan State University, East Lansing, for identification.
