



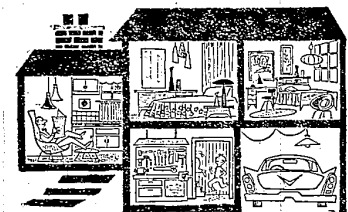

Supports Black ---

Dear Editor: It would appear to me that Justice Eugene Black has done the state a service in pointing out the need of legislative reform. While I cannot agree with certain of his recommendations, my experience of our sessions as a state representative does cause me to most definitely believe reform is needed. I agree with Justice Black in his urging for more detailed study to obtain the services of men who have the experience and training to qualify them to solve the intricate problems of modern society, and to give them sufficient time in which to study and act on the problems with which they are faced; a legislator's term should be a full time job with an adequate salary and a four-year term in which to do the job.

I agree that not more than five members are required for either legislative body of this state. I do not agree that a single body would constitute an adequate legislative body. Actual experience demonstrates many corrections of bills passed by the other house, and the defeat of many needless and/or bad bills, which succeeded in passage of the house. It is my opinion that the overwhelming majority of both parties in the Legislature would agree that this is correct.

My recommendations in addition:

1. A constitutional amendment making the Lieutenant Governor the "Governor's right hand man" in running the now extensive executive branch of government instead of wasting his time as a "figure head" president of the Senate without actual power or opportunity of leadership.

2. A constitutional amendment placing the leadership of the Senate in a president and the

House in a speaker nominated by their respective party conventions, and elected respectively by the Senate and House members. This would assure each house of a leader belonging to the majority party of that house and responsible to his party as a whole.

3. Amend the Constitution to provide that bills introduced in the odd year of each term carry over to the even year, thus providing for more detailed study of major legislation. (This is presently part of the Federal Law.)

4. Amend the Constitution to provide that the state elections now held in April of the odd numbered year be held in November; thus, providing for an annual November election, and eliminating elections during meetings of the Legislature.

5. Abolish the numerous of present commissions, and permit their duties to be handled by the respective committees of the Legislature; thus, economy in the use of public funds.

Where I most emphatically disagree with Justice Black is his contention that extensive legislative reforms can be accomplished without a Constitutional Convention. It would appear to me that the need for legislative reforms dictates a favorable vote on the question of a Constitutional Convention.
