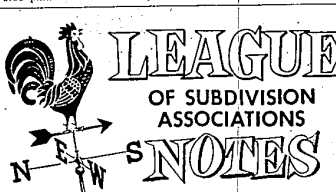

Neighbors, four petitions are being prepared for your consideration. They concern the proposed super highway, gravel and dump pits, highway speed limits and the paving of Farmington Road. The petitions will be made into a package so that you may consider all of them at one time. When prepared, the packages will be delivered to your League delegates whose responsibility will be to arrange for their circulation and then to return them to our League Secretary, Vern DeBals. There will be printed explanatory material as to each petition, which should be a welcome item to the circulator. If you have ever circulated petitions you know about that broken-record feeling which usually comes after the fifth or sixth presentation.

Our Standing Committee on School Finance is now engaged on two projects. The first is an investigation of school plant and operating costs and the other, a proposed sewer system on our schools. The committee has found out that the study of school costs is a difficult one. For example, higher plant cost can sometimes reduce operating costs; and this is just a simple example of the complications. As a starter, the committee is seeking information on school costs in the following neighboring school districts: Waller Lake, Roseland, Bloomfield, Livonia and Southfield. June Thompson of West Farmington Estates is the secretary of this committee who coordinates all these assignments.

Keep Papers, Veterans Urged

Vital family documents should be preserved because they may be needed to support claims for veterans benefits. Lloyd H. Jameson, Manager of the VA Regional Office at Detroit, advised veterans and their dependents recently.

Mr. Jameson said the documents include birth or death certificates, marriage or divorce decrees, guardianship or child custody evidence, and military discharge or separation papers.

Types of claims in which the documents may be needed in connection with disability or death compensation or pension and burial benefits, Mr. Jameson said.

"Don't throw these valuable documents away or burn them where your family cannot find them in an emergency," Mr. Jameson said.
