Jr. Football League Forming in Farmington

At a meeting held July 24 the Farmington Junior Football Association was formed. Officers were elected on a temporary basis as follows: Dick Habicht, chairman; Tom Thomson, co-chairman; Marion Spencer, secretary; treasurer, Carl Johnston, organization and publicity chairman. The team will be called The Farmington Rockets and colors will be orange and black uniforms with white helmets, it was decided. There will be two classes of competition: Freshmen composed of boys 9-10 years of age weighing 75-95 pounds, and Varsity, composed of boys 11-12 weighing from 80-125 pounds. Rules will be strictly adhered to, an official spokesman said. They are: 1. Boys must have proof of age eligibility. 2. Boys must be examined by a physician prior to participation in bodily contact. This will be done on a group basis. Notice will be given at a later date. 3. Home team shall have a physician available at all games. 4. Six scheduled games and two exhibition games are called for. Scheduled games begin the second Saturday after Labor Day, and are terminated by the first Saturday in November. Play will be on a regular 100 yard field, with 12 and 15 minute running quarters, respectively. A smaller than regulation football is used. Selection of coaches and officials is controlled by league officials who will maintain careful vigilance to prevent unsportsmanlike conduct by either players or spectators, the spokesman added. Equipment shall be of the best available quality, safety vests and proper fitting will be deemed essential. Emphasis is placed on good sportsmanship, fair play and team cooperation. There are no trophies, no championships and no individual recognition. Interested boys and their parents in Farmington Township and City (8 Mile, 14 Mile and 20 Mile) Little League are invited to attend the next meeting of the newly formed association on Thursday, August 7, at 6:30 p.m. at the Little League baseball diamond in the City Park, Shawassaw and Power roads. 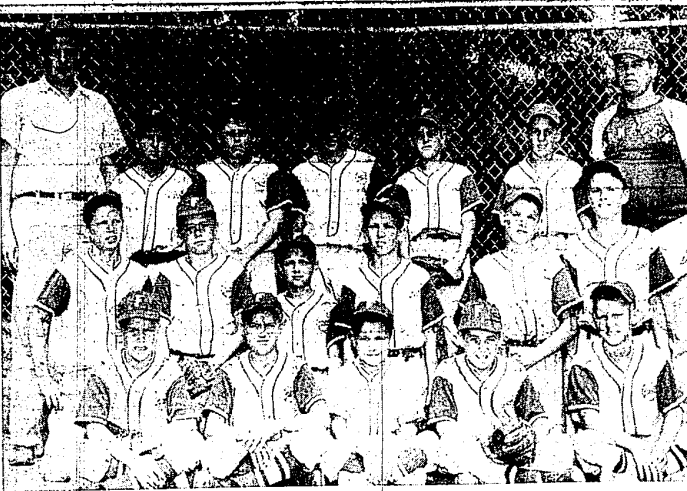
Yanks Score Two Lopsided Wins Last Week

The Yankees' 25-5 win over the Farmington Lumber Cardinals was the highest scoring ball game in the history of Little League. The Yankees batted 26 hits for 25 runs, three of them with Rick Barth's hitting his thirteenth home run of the season in the first inning, one with the bases loaded and the other with two men on, which scored the fourth run. The Yankees' eleven runs that they scored in the first inning. The Yankees made it 19-0 in the bottom of the second inning, scoring eight runs on eight hits, a walk and two errors. Mike Bar's homer opened the inning, followed by seven singles. The Yankees made it 29-3 in the bottom of the third on a single by Butch Hahn and a double by Rick Barth, his fourth hit of the ball game, and a single by Tom Bradley, who scored the final two runs in the fifth inning on Don Davis' single and Mike Weber's third home run of the season. Winning pitcher was Joe McClurg, his third win of the season. Losing pitcher was Mike Wall, his first loss of the season. The Yankees allowed eleven runs on nine hits in the first inning. Dennis Hunt relieved him in the second inning and pitched the remainder of the ball game, with 14 runs on 17 hits. The 26 hits that the Yankees collected set a record which should take some time for another team to beat. The Farmington Dairy Yanks scored the American Screw Products Orioles 16-4 and the Farmington Lumber Cards, 25-5 in games last week. Winning pitcher was John Bradley. His teammates scored 15 runs on nine hits and took advantage of five Orioles walks and thirteen errors. The Yankees made it 4-0 in the first inning on three errors and singles by Tom Bradley, and Joe McClurg, and Rick Barth's double. The Orioles scored two runs in the bottom of the first inning on a single by Pete Thomson and doubles by Bradley Parker and Dave Schlack. Running Out Of Camp Sites

Campgrounds are reported full in nearly all state parks throughout the lower peninsula. Camping has increased more than 21 percent this year from the record-breaking 1957 season. "We don't know where to put campers that keep coming," said Arthur C. Elmer, chief of the Conservation Department's parks division. Park managers keep in contact by radio, and then tell surplus campers where vacancies exist in nearby parks. But the camper has to take his chances whenever he goes. It's first-come, first-served, and space is limited.

About 45,000 camp permits have been issued, compared with 32,000 during the period last year. Day-use attendance at parks, meanwhile, is about eight percent below last year. About 67,500,000 have visited state parks 9 to date.

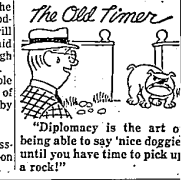
