Timely Tips on GARDENING

PERENNIAL BORDERS

Perennial borders are now a tapestry of color. The back garden is a blend of deep-green, yellow-green, and pale silvery green, is embellished with delicate pink and glowing red gladiolus, crisp white and yellow daisies, and rich blue platycodon. Bright accents are provided by the vivid pink spikes of lythrum and the yellow hemerocallis blossoms.

LATE CROP

Many vegetables can be planted throughout the month of August for a late crop. The seeds germinate quickly during the summer, and the cooler days of autumn are favorable for the maturation of the vegetable.

REMINER

Much rose beds with peat moss or buckwheat hulls to control moisture. Order plantings until Fall. They look well in a mixed border, or are effective planted by the side of a pool or stream, or at the edge of a wood.

Local Organic Garden Visited

Five Organic flower and vegetable gardens were visited by more than 70 members and guests of the Wayne County Organic Farm and Garden Club, Sunday, July 20.

Monarda has fragrant, mint-like foliage and showy flower heads. They come in candy pink, or deep pink. The plants grow two to four feet tall and do best in full sun.

Phlox is the most outstanding perennial from mid-summer on. Its large, bright flower clusters dominate the border and provide a spicy fragrance. They will grow with little or no care, but a little watering, fertilizing and spraying will reward the gardener with fresher foliage and larger bloom heads.

There are numerous "complicated" or daisy type flowers that are easily grown. Shasta daisies are exceedingly prolific. Rudbeckias are cultivated. Brown-eyed Susans that come in various shades of yellow, pink, or cream. Asters and Chrysanthemums are also hardy perennials that could be featured in a garden.

Now is the time to take a good look at your perennial garden and at your friends' gardens. Make notes of the plants, and combinations that please you.

PERENNIALS FROM SEED

This is the time to plant seeds of perennials and biennials. They do best planted in a special bed or cold frame where the tender little plants will have winter protection. These plants usually
